Phil Mahre

Former World Cup Alpine Ski Racer Fourth among Americans with 27 World Cup Wins Keynote Speaker



Phil Mahre is a former World Cup alpine ski racer, widely regarded as one of the greatest American skiers of all time. His total of 27 World Cup race wins is fourth among Americans, only behind Lindsey Vonn, Mikaela Shiffrin, and Bode Miller.

Born in Yakima, Washington, Phil and his twin brother Steve (four minutes younger) were both world class ski racers and competed on the World Cup circuit from 1976 to 1984. Starting with the 1978 season, Mahre finished in the top three in the World Cup overall standings for six consecutive seasons, winning the title in the final three (1981, 1982, and 1983). The Mahre twins retired from World Cup racing in March 1984 at age 26. On February 9, 2010, Phil was the U.S. torch bearer to carry the 2010 Vancouver torch across the U.S.-Canada border at the International Peace Arch at Blaine, Wash., and Surrey, B.C.

Mahre earned a spot on the U.S. Ski Team in early 1973 at age 15. He was selected to the "A" team following the 1975 season and made his World Cup debut in December 1975 at Val d'Isère, France. Two months later he competed at the 1976 Winter Olympics in Innsbruck, Austria, taking fifth in the giant slalom at age 18.

He made his first podium in March with a second in a giant slalom at Copper Mountain, Colo., and finished the 1976 World Cup season in 14th place in the overall standings.

He won his first World Cup race the next season, a giant slalom at Val d'Isère in December 1976, and followed it up with a slalom win in March at Sun Valley, defeating the man who became his Primary rival, the legendary Swede Ingemar Stenmark, with twin brother Steve taking third. Mahre finished ninth in the overall standings for 1977.

The following season established Phil as one of the best ski racers in the world. In 1978, he placed second in the overall standings, followed by third in 1979, despite breaking his lower left tibia in early March at the pre-Olympic giant slalom at Whiteface Mountain near Lake Placid. At the 1980 Winter Olympics in Lake Placid, he took the silver in the slalom behind Stenmark, along with a combined title (not an Olympic event in 1980, but official as a concurrent World Championship title). He again finished third in the overall World Cup standings for 1980, and won the first of four consecutive discipline titles in the combined.

Phil's career reached its zenith over the next three seasons. He won the most prestigious title in alpine skiing, the overall World Cup title, three consecutive years from 1981–83.

He narrowly edged Ingemar Stenmark, who had previously won three consecutive overall titles from 1976–78, by only 6 points to capture his first title in 1981. Phil won primarily due to his results in the downhill and combined events, as Stenmark was uncomfortable in the downhill event. Phil's finest year was 1982 when he took the event titles in the giant slalom, slalom and combined, as well as the overall title.

Phil had eight wins and 20 podium finishes and his 309 points were well ahead of Stenmark's 211. Twin brother Steve finished third overall at 183 points, and also won the World Championship in the giant slalom at Schladming, Austria.

In 1983, Phil again beat Stenmark by a large margin for the overall title, along with taking a second straight GS title.

Only four other Americans have won the World Cup overall title: Tamara McKinney (1983), Bode Miller (2005, 2008), Lindsey Vonn (2008, Lindsey Vonn 2008, 2009, 2010, 2012), and Mikaela Shiffrin (2017, 2018, 2019, 2022).

U.S. Ski Team

Luke was born and raised in Gresham, Oregon. He has one brother and two sisters and grew up skiing with his twin brother. He attended and raced for Mt Hood Academy before transferring to the Sugar Bowl Academy.

He recently received his pilot's license through Pilot Makers in Provo, Utah.

He was first nominated to the US Ski Team in 2019 and was named to the Alpine B team and US Olympic Alpine Team in 2022.

In Beijing, his first Olympic appearance, Luke placed 25th in Slalom and 42nd in Giant Slalom. His best World Championship finish has been a 6th in 2021.

In 2018, Luke and teammate River Radamus double podiumed at the World Junior Championships in Davos, Switzerland.

In 2019, Luke grabbed his first national championship title, landing on the top of the podium in alpine combined at Sugarloaf, Maine. He followed that up with his second national title, in slalom, at Waterville Valley, N.H.

After Luke graduates, he hopes to work in construction, engineering, or real estate.

Matt Zaffino's career in television stems at KGW. from his love of weather, which is rooted in his love for being outdoors and in the wilderness.

In his high school German class, his teacher drew weather maps on the chalkboard explaining the conditions needed to create a snowstorm and get everyone out of school for a day. He's been making weather maps ever since.

Matt studied meteorology at the University of Utah, and then interned and worked as a weather producer at KTVX in Salt Lake City. In 1984 he moved to Traverse City, Mich., to forecast weather at WGTU, and then to Battle Creek, Mich., where he anchored the morning and evening weathercasts.

He happily returned to the West in 1985 and worked at a couple different stations until 1996, when he helped launch KATU's morning news. He was later promoted to the evening newscasts. It was also in 1996, that Matt left KATU to become Chief Meteorologist

The Oregon Associated Press named him Best Weathercaster in 1994, 1997, 1998, 1999 and 2002, 2006, 2008, 2009, 2012 and 2015.

Matt won Emmy Awards for outstanding individual achievement in weathercasting in 2000, 2015 and 2016.

In 2016 he was inducted into the prestigious National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences (NATAS) Silver Circle for 25+ years of outstanding service in broadcasting in the Northwest.

He is the only person that has ever done a live television broadcast from the top of Mount Hood. Matt also reported for KGW from the Summer Olympics in Sydney, Australia in 2000 and the Winter Olympics in Utah in 2002 and Vancouver, B.C., in 2010.

He has done many school visits over the years teaching Portland students about the science and beauty of weather.

Matt's community involvement in-



cludes work with the Oregon Humane Society, the Feral Cat Coalition of Oregon, Medical Teams International and The American Cancer Society. Matt also served on the Board of Trustees for the Oregon Chapter of the Leukemia-Lymphoma Society.





Written in the Snows: Across Time on Skis in the Pacific Northwest




Lindsay Vonn shares her incredible journey for the first time, going behind the scenes of her badass life built around resilience and risk-taking.


While this iconic grit and perseverance young women. help her battle a myriad of injuries, these injuries came at a cost, both physical and

This Northern California documentary of another Tahoe-centric film, Magic in the Mountains, tells the remarkable underdog story of how Squaw Valley, a little-known ski area in the Sierra Nevada, won the bid for the 1960 Winter Olympic Games and, with the help of Walt Disney changed forever the ways in which the Winter Olympic Games were presented.

The documentary features neverbefore-seen archival footage from the 1960 Olympic Games and revealing interviews with participating athletes and attendees.

The 1960 edition of the Olympics introduced a substantial array of 'firsts,' including such innovations as live broadcast, instant replay, sponsorships, and an official Olympic Village for the athletes.

Walt Disney's involvement in producing the Games at Squaw Valley featured an unprecedented, but soon to become standard, level of pageantry for the opening and closing ceremonies.

The FWSA Snowsports Builder Award is given to individuals who have made an indelible positive impact on snowsports. The builder may be honored for achievements in athletics, the press, publishers, historians, industry, humanitarian work, area development, or technology. In short, they honor those who have made significant contributions to snowsports.

The Drake Family

Founders and Operators of Mt. Hood Meadows

In 1966, a company headed by Franklin Drake and his two brothers, Donald and Mitchell, edged out a Hood Riverbased group and got a 30-year lease from the U.S. Forest Service to build and operate a ski resort on Mt. Hood's east side.

Franklin Drake, an enthusiastic skier himself, used helicopters to haul concrete and steel for the two original chairlifts. He managed to build a lodge, a parking lot, all the infrastructure and the lifts in a year and opened for business in 1967.

half-a-million people a year, second only to Mt. Bachelor. Drake managed the resort until 2006, when his son, Matthew Drake, took over. Franklin Drake died in 2021.

The Drake family has maintained a philosophy of continuous improvement and development at Mt. Hood Meadows. The ski resort has expanded over the years, the most notable was the development of the adjacent Heather Canyon ski area in the 1980's. In 1984, they began adding triple and quad express lifts.

While Mt. Hood Meadows had always been committed to preserving and maintaining the environment in which it operates, it was the 90's in when it became recognized as being on the leading edge of these environmental issues.

The resort was the recipient of Mt. Hood Meadows now draws about NSAA's prestigious "Golden Eagle Environmental Excellence Award" in 2015. The Resort received the Recycler of the Year from the Association of Oregon Recyclers in 2016.

> Mt. Hood Meadows began construction of the new Sahale Lodge in 2019. It is the first significant commercial im-



provement at the Resort since 1999. The Lodge was designed to add 10,000 square feet for dining and 13,500 square feet for skier services. Sahale is equipped with a heated roof and concrete embedded hydronic snow-melt system in the outdoor dining area and entry slabs.

Mt. Hood Meadows was named to the list of 100 Best Companies to Work for in Oregon by Oregon Business Magazine, as well as making the Top 100 Green Companies to Work For, marking the seventh year in a row Meadows received the award.

Kirk Hanna Operator Mt. Hood Ski Bowl & Developer Collins Lake Resort



Kirk Hanna purchased the Mt. Hood Skibowl ski area in 1987. Mt. Hood Skibowl is located just below Government Camp.

Mt. Hood Skibowl's origin dates back to 1928, making the resort one of the oldest remaining ski resorts in the country. The ski area began as two separate resorts--Skibowl and Multorpor.

While Skibowl's name was derived from the natural shape of its Upper Bowl, Multorpor's name came from the combination Multnomah County, Oregon and Portland.

The famous Jump Hill on Multorpor Mountain was developed by Everett Sickler in 1928 and one year later the newly-formed Cascade Ski Club began holding competitions at Multorpor's Jump Hill. The area gained national recognition after holding an official National Ski Association event.

Kirk Hanna purchased Skibowl out of bankruptcy in 1987 and formed H-Ski Corporation. He made major improvements to the resort by adding the 300 acres outback, cutting the Olympic Certified Reynolds Run and expanding the night skiing to 34 lighted runs making Skibowl "America's Largest Night Ski Area." He also remodeled and reopened the Historic Warming Hut.

Hanna also built upon the summer activities, adding mountain biking, Indy Karts, Miniature Golf, group functions, and some inflatable summer recreation.

In 1993, Skibowl added a 100-foot Bungee Tower to its summer attractions. Skibowl success been its year round recreational activities.

The Lower Bowl was completely rebuilt. Everything was replaced but towers and chairs. The Upper Bowl also received new improvements. Multorpor Chairand the Lower Bowl lift terminal are completely rebuilt, resulting in shorter rides, faster chairlifts and more seating.

Kirk Hanna developed Collins Lake Resort, providing luxury lodging in the heart of Government Camp near Mt. Hood Skibowl.

The Kohnstamm Family Operators of Timberline Lodge & Timberline Ski Area

Richard L. Kohnstamm was the president and area operator of Timberline Lodge and Ski Area from 1955 until 1992, when he turned the operation over to his son leff.

Dick Kohnstamm passed away in 2006. U.S. Representative Earl Blumenauer memorialized him before the House of Representatives as "a visionary leader who conceived and then for half a century led the Kohnstamm family crusade to restore the jewel that is Timberline Lodge."

When he first saw Timberline Lodge in 1955, Dick Kohnstamm was immediately enamored of the building. Built in 1936-1937 under the auspices of the Works Progress Administration and furnished with art and furniture commissioned under the Federal Art Project, the lodge had opened to the public in 1938. It fell into disrepair and was closed in 1955. The U.S. Forest Service, which administers the lodge, revoked the permit and sought a new operator.

With the encouragement of lodge employee and former WPA worker Jim Duncan, Kohnstamm applied for and was awarded the permit. He formed R.L.K. and Company and set about developing the lodge and ski area—a labor of love to which he devoted his life.

Kohnstamm installed the Pucci and Victoria Station chairlifts, and he purchased SnoCats to transport skiers and tourists to snow fields above the lodge's elevation 6,000-foot elevation. Kohnstamm created the first summer skiing opportunities in North America with the completion of the Palmer chairlift in 1978.

When Kohnstamm lobbied Congress for funds to build a convention center and day lodge for skiers, he told congressional committees that Timberline was both a hotel and a museum. Running the lodge without a day lodge, he said, was "like trying to run an exclusive restaurant in the Lincoln Memorial."

Congress added supplementary funds to the U.S. Forest Service budgets for the new wing and the day lodge, The C.S. Price Wing was completed in 1975, and the Wy'East Day Lodge opened for the 1981-1982 ski season.

Recently, under Jeff Kohnstamm's leadership, Timberline purchased a



small ski area called "Summit" in Government Camp. Now called "Summit Pass," the area will be the location of a new day lodge and a new Timberline Gondola that will shuttle guests from the Government Camp area to Timberline Lodge and Ski Area. The Timberline Gondola is the cornerstone of Timberline's Upgrade Plan which was reviewed and accepted by the US Forest Service in 2022.

Board of Trustees Report

The FWSA Board of Trustees oversees the financial health of the organization and has responsibility for long range planning to support the goals of the Association. Trustees provide the experience and leadership to plan and implement new programs, guidance for operation of functional programs, and direct oversight of the Far West Ski Association's Annual Convention, the Athletic Scholarship Program, and the Awards Program. The Trustees also recommend changes to the organizations structure and By-Laws of the Association when appropriate.

The FWSA Board of Trustees is comprised of four elected Trustees - Tom Bundgard, Tucker Hoffmann, Sheri Parshall and me as Trustee Chair. President Gloria Raminha, Past President Steve Coxen, and Treasurer, Randy Lew also serve as Trustees, and Secretary Tan Nguyen provides support.

Elected Trustees typically serve two-year terms, with two of four of these positions open for election each year at the Annual Meeting. With the 2020 Annual Meeting canceled due to COVID, and the 2021 Annual Meeting postponed from June to October, four Trustees were elected, two incumbents for 8 month terms, one incumbent and new Trustee Sheri Parshall for one-year eight-month terms.

FWSA continued to operate in the challenging restricted travel environment in 2021and 2022. Randy Lew led the Roatan Dive Trip. The Snowmass North American Ski Week was safely led by Nancy Ellis, with group events again being modified to conform to COVID restrictions. Debbie Stewart led a group of International travelers to ski Sölden, Austria ,and to visit the Black Forest in Germany. Debbie navigated continuously changing international travel restrictions. Several participants tested positive for Covid, forcing them to alter and postpone return travel plans. Once again Debbie heroically got everyone home safely. The Mini Ski Week to Zermatt, Utah, was led by Gloria Raminha and well attended. Refer to the Treasurer's Report to review the 2021 & 2022 Travel Program Financials, which show healthy revenue and well managed expenses.

Far West Ski Association's Annual Convention is a flagship program that provides a forum for our membership and industry partners to gather together for planning, learning and celebration of snow sports. FWSA Trustees and Debbi Kor, FWSA Convention Chairperson, renegotiated contracts and rescheduled the 2021 Annual Convention to the off-cycle October date. Debbi and NWSCC leaders Sheri Parshall and Chris Ciardi planned the June 2022 with support from numerous FWSA and local volunteers. The Annual Convention is a critical part of the FWSA revenue stream to fund our programs. Convention Financials depend on attendance by delegates, Silent Auction attendees, and industry partners. Attendance is down from usual participation levels, affected in part by high costs of air travel. A Convention Task Force has been formed and is chaired by Debbi Kor, supported by Trustee Sheri Parshall, with industry partners Maxine Jensen (Alpine Adventures) and Mary Manning (Snowmass) joining us to evaluate and evolve for the future.

The FWSA Awards Program includes Service Awards, Industry Awards, Media Awards, and the Snowsports Builder Award, recognizing individuals for their exceptional contributions. Thank you to Steve Coxen who chairs this program, and to Joe Harvis, Director of FWSA Communications, who provided technical support for publishing citations and administering voting via our new FWSA Club Express Website.

Randy Lew, FWSA Treasurer, provides the Association with detailed, timely, and accurate financial reporting and budget control. John Reinhardt, our Tax Advisor, prepares and files our corporate tax returns and ensures that we are in compliance with Federal and State regulations, with support and oversight from the Board of Trustees.

Athletic Scholarship Program by David Krupp, Chair

The Far West Ski Association Athletic Scholarship Program is in its 18th year, growing from an initial \$1,500 in scholarships in 2004 to \$7,650 and 14 recipients in the 2021-2022 season. The total awarded since the program's inception is more than \$170,000 to 126 basis of financial need, competitive recipients.

We express our thanks to our sponsors, Kandahar Lodge and Grouse Mountain Lodge at Whitefish Mountain Resort, Schure Sports (maker of the Karbon line of snowsports clothing), and Far West Racing Association. We would also like to thank our partners, Skiyenti Ski Club, Mountain High Snowsports Club, Los Angeles Council of Ski Clubs, San Diego Council of Ski Clubs, Northwest Ski Club Council and Sierra League and Council. Finally, a special thanks to all the Far West members who have so generously contributed to the program.

United States Ski Association licensed junior racers in the U21, U19, and second year UI6 classes in states

represented by FWSA affiliated councils are eligible for a scholarship. This year, junior racers in California, Nevada, Arizona, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Utah and Wyoming are eligible.

Scholarships are awarded on the accomplishments, academics, and community service. National ranking in competitive skiing can cost well in excess of \$10,000 per season; a financial challenge for even upper middle class families. The need is great and we anticipate that the number of applications will continue to increase.

Convention attendees have the opportunity to support the Athletic Scholarship Program by participating in the auction of a ski and stay package donated by Kandahar Lodge and Grouse Mountain Lodge and our raffle featuring an assortment of great prizes. Raffle tickets cost \$5 each or five for \$20.

All funds for the scholarship program are deposited with The Far West Ski

Committee Report **Awards Program** by Steve Coxen, Immediate Past President

In a volunteer organization such as Far West Ski Association nothing happens without individuals contributing their time and talent to produce programs. These dedicated people could never be compensated for the contribution they make to the association. For volunteer organizations, recognition is the most valuable thank-you that can be offered. In many ways the maturity and stature of an organization can be measured by the value that individuals place on the recognition program. Far West has one of the broadest programs of any regional ski association in the country and there are many opportunities for aspiring individuals, clubs, and councils to gain recognition. The modern day Awards Program was initiated in 1966 and has witnessed a series of expansions and changes over the years. For 2007, optional electronic submissions and voting has been added to the Far West Service awards. The Charity and Community Service Recognition Award for Clubs and Councils was added in 2007. Historical recognition for clubs and councils was added in 2008. In 2008, under the direction of John Watson, the Snowsports Builder Award was initiated. The Environment Award was added in 2015.

There have been a number of changes to the Club and Council Recognition Awards since 2015. The intention is to bring awareness to our programs and make the awards easier to apply for. This year all application forms were again standardized and fillable electronically. The Communications Awards continue to be done through online or email submittals and were modified again in 2018.

Far West Service Awards

The Far West Service awards, sometimes referred to as "The Great Eight" are administered by Steve Coxen, FWSA Awards Chair and Immediate Past President, with a committee consisting of Joe Harvis, FWSA VP of Communications, Todd Hood, FWSA Succession Planning Committee Chair, and Gloria Raminha, FWSA President. Use of the Internet continues to be the popular and a most efficient means of submitting nominations and voting. Voting was permitted using the Internet, email or by the traditional USPS mail. This and past year's nominee citations can be viewed at https://fwsa.org/ - click on the Awards tab.

These awards are given to individuals or a team within the Far West Ski Association or Ski Industry. All accepted citations are archived at the Western SkiSport Museum in Boreal, California as a living history of volunteerism in the Far West Region. In addition to commemorative plaques and medallions, a permanent display of past recipients is showcased at the Museum. The Museum is administered by the Auburn Ski Club (http:// www.auburnskiclub.org/), one of the founding ski clubs of the Far West Ski Association.

Hans Georg Award (1966 - present)

The Hans George Award is given for distinguished accomplishment and long-term contribution to snowsports. This award is given to an individual or individuals who have contributed significant achievements to snowsports, not necessarily organized snowsports. It reflects a long term contribution and is the highest award of the Far West Ski Association. This award may only be received once and is based on a ten-year minimum service in the Far West region.

Elizabeth 'Schatzi' Wood Award (1966 - present)

The Elizabeth Schatzi Wood Award is given to the woman, in the Far West region, who has, through efforts in ski club, council, region, national or international activities, made a decisive contribution to snowsports during either the past year or in a prior year This award may only be received once and is based on one or two year achievement (not long-term service) in the Far West region. The two years of service can be for prior years, not just the past two years.

J. Stanley Mullin Award (1966 - present)

The J. Stanley Mullin Award is given to the man, in the Far West region, who has, through efforts in ski club, council, region, national or international activities, made a decisive contribution to snowsports during either the past year or in a prior year This award may only be received once and is based on one or two year achievement (not long-term service) in the Far West region. The two years of service can be for prior years, not just the past two years.

Jordan-Reily Award (1991 - present)

The Jordan-Reily Award recognizes a one or two year activity and achievement in the FWSA Public Affairs programs—area development, skier safety, ski area sustainability efforts, liability protections, governmental affairs, taxation and transportation. This award may only be received once and is based on one or two year achievement (not long-term service). This award may also be given to an individual in government or the ski industry. Jimmie Heuga Award (1987 - present)

The Jimmie Heuga Award is given to the individual who, like Jimmie, has made a significant contribution to disabled snowsports and/or has overcome a physical disability and has been an inspiration to others. This award may only be received once.

Tommi Tyndall Award (1966 - present)

The Tommi Tyndall Award is given to the ski area, ski area operator; tourism bureau, or the ski area association who has made a distinguished contribution to snowsports and/or the Far West Ski Association in the past year or in prior years. This award may be received more than once but not in consecutive years. This award is based on one or two year contribution. The two years of service can be for prior years, not just the past two years.

Bill Mackey Award (1972 - present)

The Bill Mackey Award is given for outstanding service to the snowsports public by a ski industry or ski area employee. This award may be received more than once but not in consecutive years. Recipients must be full-time employee in the ski industry or related industry and cannot be a FWSA board member, trustee or appointed chairperson.

Terry Smith Award (1976 - present)

The Terry Smith Award is given to an outstanding individual who has greatly contributed to the advancement of recreational ski racing. This award may only be received once. Only elected officers of Far West Racing Association, including race league chairpersons and past Terry Smith Award recipients, are allowed to nominate and vote.

Snowsports Builder Award

John Watson, History Chair, along with the Far West Board of Trustees, administers the Snowsports Builder award. In 2008 Far West added this award to expand its suite of awards. The award recognizes an individual, teams or an organization that has made a significant contribution to benefit the sport, a contribution that has made an indelible impact on the sport and that may not have been fully recognized. Such contributions may not be limited to any sector of industry, society, or the sport. Their background could include manufacturing, athletics, travel, journalism, electronic or print media, government, academia, teaching, and safety. The Snowsports Builder Award is intended to be for those outside Far West's traditional service awards and may be made annually by the Trustees.

Industry Media Awards

The Industry Media awards are administered by Steve Coxen

with a committee consisting of Randy Lew, FWSA Treasurer, and Gloria Raminha, FWSA President.

Billy Berry Award for Hard News (1966 - present)

Awarded for outstanding service to snowsports by writers for the printed media of an outstanding article, website, or on-line blog. This award allows for self-nomination and may be received more than once but not in consecutive years. Billy Berry Award for Feature Article (1991 - present) Awarded for outstanding service to snowsports by writers for the printed media in a featured article or book. This award allows for self-nomination and may be received more than once but not in consecutive years.

Warren Miller Modern Media Award (was the Bill Berry Modern Media Award from 1982 to 2004) Awarded for outstanding service to snowsports by the film, television, radio, and electronic media. This award allows for self-nomination and may be received more than once but not in consecutive years.

Club & Council Achievement Recognition Awards

A difference to the judging procedure was introduced in 2017. A committee from the Councils' President was formed to do all the judging. Criteria were changed slightly to make the process less complicated. and add an emphasis on social media communications.

Tollakson Award for Outstanding Club

The Tollakson Award is administered by Bill King, assisted by Chris Gill, FWSA VP of Council Services. Each club is asked to submit up a bio detailing their contributions to snowsports. Results from their Newsletter and Web site scores are included in this competition.

Wentworth Award for Outstanding Club and Council Publications

The Wentworth Award is administered by Bill King, assisted by Chris Gill, FWSA VP of Council Services. Each club and council is asked to submit one newsletter for judging.

Award for Outstanding Club and Council Web Sites The Award for Outstanding Web Site is administered by Bill King, assisted by Chris Gill, FWSA VP of Council Services. Each club and council is asked to submit their web site URL for judging. Entries in the Publication Awards will have their web site automatically entered.

Classes for the Tollakson, Wentworth and Outstanding Web Site are based on a club's performance over the past four years that can vary slightly from year to year. A club may fall into a different class in each of the three categories.

Masters: Any club that has received a 1st place Advanced award or a 1st 2nd or 3rd place Masters award for their club for outstanding club, publication or website within the last four years.

Advanced: Any club that has received a 1st place Novice or a 2nd or 3rd place Advanced award for their club for outstanding club, publication or website within the last four years.

Novice: Club who has not won an award in the past 4 years. or a 1st place Novice award.

Council: Open to all councils

Recognition Awards

Councils' Volunteer of the Year

The Councils' Volunteer of the Year Competition is administered by Sheri Parshall, and assisted by Chris Gill, FWSA VP of Council Services. Each council is requested to submit a candidate who best represents their council. In addition, each council is required to submit one judge to help with the judging. This award is presented to an outstanding volunteer at the grassroots level. Selection criteria is based on each individual's involvement in snowsports; club, council, regional and national activities; and knowledge and enthusiasm for the snowsports. Candidates should have awareness of Far West programs and in particular, its public affairs involvement. Emphasis has been shifted to Club participation over the past five years. The Councils' Volunteer of the Year is sponsored by Big White Ski Resort, BC, Canada since 2001.

Western Ski Heritage Award

This award is administered by John Watson, FWSA History Committee Chair, assisted by Lina Arnold, FWSA VP of Public Affairs, and Gloria Raminha, FWSA President. This award recognizes an outstanding effort in the area of ski history by historians in the identification of resource material, preparation of historical publications and/or recording or documenting of significant historical events. This award also recognizes interest in Far West's history through collection, preservation and protection of appropriate articles and material. This award acknowledges the utilization of all types of media and is not limited to FWSA members. This award has been sponsored by Steamboat Ski & Resort Corp. since its inception in 2000.

Richard Lubin Safety Person of the Year Award

This award is administered by Monica Palmer, Safety Chair, Linda Arnold, FWSA VP of Public Affairs, assisted by Gloria Raminha, FWSA President. This award honors the person within FWSA who does the most to promote safe snowsports and safety programs at the club and/or council level. Individuals are judged through the utilization of organized events, educational forums, print and electronic media, on mountain activities and partnering with other, safety focused community and industry organizations. The Safety Award has been sponsored Mammoth Mountain since 2020.

Environment Award

This award is administered by Fran Long, Environment Chair, Lina Arnold, FWSA VP of Public Affairs, assisted by Gloria Raminha, FWSA President. The award is designed to encourage good stewardship of our environment. We want to inspire and reward creative efforts to conserve and protect our environment. This award recognizes a special action that the applicant took, or something the applicant put in place that made a difference. This award has been sponsored by Aspen Skiing Company, The Gant and Crestwood Condominiums since its inception in 2015.

Club and Council History Recognition Program

FWSA has inaugurated a program to collect club, league and council histories. This information will go to make up a historic collection available to researchers and possibly a book of histories from the standpoint of organized snowsports. All submissions must be on CD/DVD with 5 copies and one hard copy. Notify John Watson, FWSA Historian at geospace@pacbell.net.

Charity and Community Service Recognition Award

The Charity Award is administered by Sigrid Noack, Charity and Community Service Committee Chair, assisted by Chris Gill, FWSA VP of Council Services. There are 3 categories.

Double Diamond: A club that has won a 1st place in the past.

Diamond: A club that has not won a 1st place in the past **Council:** A class of its own.

Social Media Award

The Social Media Award was created in 2021 and is administered by Todd Hood, Social Media Awards Chair. Clubs and Councils compete collectively and those that wish to compete for this award submit their Facebook Insights file details. Club Facebook Groups and one club Facebook Page earn points in each of the sub-categories in activity, growth, and engagement with points tallied to determine the winners.

Youth and Family Award

The Youth and Family program is creating an award for 2023 to recognize the efforts of clubs and councils that have shown outstanding achievement in their efforts to bring youth and families into Far West Ski Association.

President's Award

The President of FWSA selects the recipient. This award recognizes one or more individuals who have made a significant contribution during the year to the goals of the Far West Ski Association or to the snowsports experience of the "Western Skier."

Snowsports Awards

Joe Ross Memorial Trophy

This award is administered by the Far West Ski Association's Ski Week Staff and is presented to the club with the highest total points for the Slalom and Giant Slalom races at the FWSA North American Ski Week.

Lake Louise Trophy

This award is administered by the Far West Ski Association's Ski Week Staff and is presented to the council with the highest total points for the Slalom and Giant Slalom races at the FWSA North American Ski Week. The trophy, donated by the Canadian Tourism Office in 1997, is on permanent display at the Western SkiSport Museum (http:// auburnskiclub.com/ski-museum/) in Boreal, California.

Council Challenge

The first Council Challenge was first held in 1988 at the FWSA Ski Week in Mt. Bachelor when the Bay Area Council challenged the Northwest Council (then known as Portland Area Ski Club Council) to a "duel" race. Teams consisted of the best 6 racers from each council. The following year at the FWSA Ski Week at Steamboat the Challenge was opened up to all councils. In a surprise move, Arizona beat out Northwest, Bay Area and Los Angeles. Today teams consist of 8 racers from each council and must be a mix of men and women. And if you can't beat them on the course, your team can compete for the best costume.

Far West Championships

Awarded to the Far West race league that earns the most points overall at the Far West Championships. The Far West Racing Association administers this award.

Roma McCoy Trophy

Awarded to the Far West race league that earns the most points per racer start at the Far West Championships. The Far West Racing Association administers this award.

Ski Industry Recognition Certificates

Long-term ski industry supporters and sponsors of Far West and the FWSA annual convention are recognized with certificates of appreciation. This award is administered by Debbi Kor, VP Marketing and Sponsorship.

Director Report Industry Marketing by Debbi Kor, VP Marketing & Mary Ohlhausen, Silent Auction Chair

Responsibilities for the Industry Marketing Program include: producing the Trade Show and Silent Auction, sponsorship development, serving on the Convention Committee, and promoting advertising sales for the Far West Skier's Guide. Debbi Kor, FWSA Vice President of Marketing, is responsible for the membership benefits program and product sponsorship development. Mary Olhausen is this year's annual Silent Auction Manager. Leigh Gieringer is Editor of the Far West Skier's Guide. The ski industry invested over \$65,000 last year in Association industry programs.

Silent Auction

In 2022, we are celebrating the 89th Annual Convention, and the 36th Silent Auction. FWSA highly values the long-standing working relationship that our Association has developed with the many ski and sports-industry partners over the years. Immeasurable hours have been spent by dedicated ski club, council and FWSA volunteers, who assist with conducting a successful Silent Auction and Trade Show each year.

The Silent Auction began back in 1986 at the Irvine Hilton and Towers, when the Balboa Ski Club of Orange Council of Ski Clubs, host for the 54th Annual Convention, organized the event as a fundraiser to be held in conjunction with the Convention. In 1990 the Travel Carousel was added to the industry Convention programs at the 58th Annual Convention, hosted by the Orange Council of Ski Clubs, when the Association returned to the Irvine Hilton. The format remained the same until the 2003 Convention held at the Rancho Las Palmas Marriott in Rancho Mirage, California, hosted by the San Diego Council of Ski Clubs. The Travel Carousel became the Travel Expo, and Passports replaced the Lift Tickets. This year, however, we are going back to the All-In-One concept, and are including the former Travel Expo into the 2022 Trade Show and Silent Auction on Friday night.

The Silent Auction is the Association's major fund-raising effort and not only provides financial support for our programs, but also subsidizes delegate fees to the Convention. The Trade Show and Silent Auction would not be possible without the assistance of many special people. Many thanks go to this year's Hosts, Northwest Ski Club Council, as well as the many volunteers who helped with all the behind-the-scenes work and setup. The "Convention Team", tasked with producing the Trade Show and Silent Auction includes Debbi Kor, Convention Chair and V.P. of Marketing and Sponsorship, as well as Registrar for all of our industry partners; Mary Olhausen, our current Silent Auction Manager, and Sigrid Noack and Linda McGavin, who assist Mary. Along with these folks, Jean McCasey, Registrar and V.P. of Membership who assisted Randy Lew in lining up the presenters for the Snow Sports Leadership Academy; Fran Long and Lina Arnold, VP of Public Affairs, assisted with the Speakers for the Public Affairs Panel Sessions; Barbara Razo, produced all of the Coupon Books; and Leigh Gieringer, Far West Skie's Guide Editor, put the Award Booklet together. Jo Simpson has been doing the Delegate Book for the past few years, and Joe Harvis, has manned the slide show on Saturday during lunch and dinner for the past two years. This team put in countless hours to bring you an outstanding event for both club members and the industry. Our gratitude is extended to all the workers from the host council, all of the FWSA Board Members, friends and volunteers from other councils who assisted with all the last-minute preparations prior to the Trade Show and Silent Auction to get the job done and make this an event to remember.

Convention Sponsorships

Tennis, free nonmotorized water sports, archery, rifle shooting, beach volleyball, table tennis, basketball, water aerobics, gym, and full program of entertainment. Complimentary Wi Fi is also included.

Whether it was which country was on the "High Risk List", required government registration documents, necessary vaccination records, or pre-trip registration requirements, we worked hard to keep everyone aware and updated as the information constantly changed.

My Trip Motto was...CONFUSED YET??? Don't be...IT will Probably Change AGAIN!

Forty-two (42) participants thoroughly enjoyed the beautiful scenery and extraordinary ski area of Solden. It may not be a household name to you, but it will be one that you will never forget after being there. We worked with the experts at HOLIDAZE Ski Tours to organize this fantastic trip February 25 – March 5, 2022. Solden offers 3 areas: Solden, Obergurgl and Hochgurgl. They kick off the winter season with the Audi FIS Alpine Ski World Cup Opening in October. And...it has one of the action-scene sites for the James Bond movie "Spectre". The huge number of slopes and ski trails for all levels and abilities coupled with the perfect grooming with 91 miles of slopes make Solden a truly unique winter sports center; 32 state-of-the-art ski lifts and gondolas with a total capacity of 70,000 persons/hour guarantee ultimate skiing fun.

Mid-week thirty-two people went on the optional day tour to the Swarovski Crystal World factory in Wattens, then on to Innsbruck. On the bus ride, Freddie our guide told us about the Tyrol area in which Solden is a part of. The Tyrol area has a population of 850,000 people and ninety-six resorts for winter sports and summer activities. There are many luxury hotels, pensions, boarding houses, and rooms for rent located at various farmhouses. He pointed out fabulous houses built in the 1500's in a gothic style.

Even though we did not get to see how the crystals are made...that is a Secret, there are many magnificent chambers exhibiting amazing Swarovski Crystals – BLING, BLING, and more Beautiful BLING! Not only did the displays show incredible jewelry, costumes, statues, monuments, outdoor playground, and the largest crystal wall on earth. We learned that Crystals consist of basic shapes that unfold withing the space as precisely as poetically, in a manner as simple as it is complex. What a treat it was to experience this unique facility. Then, off to Innsbruck which hosted the 1964 and 1976 Winter Olympics. Some enjoyed a walking tour with Freddie to learn about this famous walled city including the Imperial Palace and the Golden Roof, which is the Innsbruck's landmark in the heart of the old town, built by Emperor Maximilian.

On March 5th, some left Solden to travel back to the U.S., others to travel Europe on their own and the remaining twenty of us traveled by bus to Titisee-Neustadt for our Black Forest Region extension trip.

Lake Titisee is Black Forest's most picturesque glacial lake. We visited the charming towns of Freiburg, Triberg, Colmar, Kayserberg, Heidelberg, Strasbourg and overnight in Frankfurt before flying home. We had guided city tours, visited the 12th-century Gothic Freiburg Cathedral landmark, Heidelberg Palace, museums, the Strasbourg Cathedral, and of course free time to explore on your own...to hunt for your own Cuckoo Clock or the "Best Black Forest Cake"! This was an experience like no other.

Director Report North American Travel

NORTH AMERICAN TRAVEL PROGRAM UPDATES

- The Travel Improvement Committee continues to work on drafting Goals and Objectives for improving the **Travel Program:**
 - Goal I: To Increase "First Timer" Trip Participation by 10% Annually (all FWSA Trips Combined)
 - Goal 2: To Standardize the Implementation of the Travel Program (North American & International) Goal 3: To Create a VP Travel Succession Plan that includes a Mentorship Program.
- The VP of International Travel, Debbie Stewart, and I are working to update information for the FWSA Operations Manual.
- There is a need to develop FWSA Travel Guidelines for planning trips when contagious diseases are a concern in the United States or Countries where trips are planned.

2022 NORTH AMERICAN TRIPS/EVENTS

MOUNTAIN TRAVEL SYMPOSIUM (MTS)—April 6—10, 2022

- MTS was in Vail, CO this year.
- Trends in Group Travel:

It's more difficult for groups to get the lodging they need as less is available for groups as homeowners aren't including their units in the rental pool for groups. They don't want to have their unit rented at a discounted rate, which is what clubs/groups tend to use.

Ski Clubs/Councils need to consider booking their trips earlier than they normally would do so. There is a huge demand for leisure travel and resorts are not booking groups as in the past. Resorts can get three times the rate for their rooms from Frequent Individual Travelers (FIT) willing to pay at the last minute (less than 30days of the trip.

It's highly suggested that ski clubs/councils adjust the type of trips that they do. No longer is booking a large group a draw to a resort. Resorts now favor booking smaller groups several times a year instead of booking 1 or 2 large club trips.

- Resorts are now giving group lodging rates later than normal which makes it harder to plan a trip. Resorts more likely to offer hotel rooms to groups needing to use conference facilities where they make more money for food services.
- Lodging properties are using non-refundable deposits to book rooms ahead of time and to hold the space. Make sure to pay any lodging deposits by the required deadline or you risk losing your rooms to another group who will pay the deposit on time.
- Make sure you know if your group is earning full comps or partial comps. For example, are you getting 1:25 and earn only 1 comp for bringing 32 people, or are you getting partial comps and earning more than 1 comp when you bring 1.32 people? The Tour Operator or resort is getting the extra if you don't get the partial comps.
- IKON passes: If your tour operator or tour company is offering your trip participants a "perk" for buying the Pass through a special website and then signing up for your trip, you are required to follow some rules. Must put "IKON" in all caps.

Do not indicate what the "perk" is in a public forum such as on your website, in newsletters, FACEBOOK, etc. You can tell people in a closed setting what they will get, such as \$50 off their lodging package. Refer to the benefit: Participants will get a "perk" for purchasing the pass on our special website (link) and then signing up for the trip.

- I met with several Tour Operators and Tour Companies about trip destinations for the 2023 North American Adventure Trip, 2024 Mini Trip, and 2024 ski week.
- 2023 MTS will be held March 29--April I in Banff/Lake Louise.

SNOWMASS SKI WEEK -- JANUARY 29—FEBRUARY 5, 2022

- We had 305 people signed up for the trip..
- 37 people purchased the IKON or IKON Base Pass Plus using the special FWSA/Ski.com link and they received a benefit for signing up for the ski trip. The IKON pass was good for 7 days at Snowmass and the three other Aspen Ski Resorts. The IKON Base Pass Plus was good for 5 days at Snowmass and Aspen Resorts.
- We modified our events due to COVID protocols in place during the week we were there. Inside events were cancelled except for the Friday Après party and our picnic, which took place both inside or outside. People had a gift certif-

icate and coupon for food/dessert that they could use to eat at the restaurant or for take-out food.

- The last minute changes to our parties due to COVID protocols, unexpected sponsorship by Aspen/Snowmass for the races, and reduced costs for many ski week activities which we normally expect and were unable to anticipate with the last minute changes, resulted in refunds to ski week participants.
- Trip participants received gift certificates and coupons for food while at ski week.
- Trip participants who cancelled the trip and didn't have replacements or who didn't receive other trip related refunds, received partial amenities refunds.
- All Trip Participants who attended ski week are eligible to receive a trip refund. Each Council has received trip refunds for their Snowmass Participants. Councils will determine the best way to get the refunds to their trip participants.
- Everyone attending the Snowmass Ski Week had a great time, with good skiing, fantastic food at local restaurants, and a fun time visiting friends.

2022 ZERMATT RESORT AND SPA MINI TRIP—MARCH 20—25, 2022

- We had a great time on this year's mini ski trip to Zermatt Utah Resort in Midway, Utah.
- 44 people from several states arrived March 20th for 6 days of skiing either Park City, Deer Valley, or Sun Dance, or all three resorts.
- We had complimentary shuttle service for our group which made it easy to get to the ski areas.
- Our week started with a Welcome Breakfast and information about the area. We ended the week with a private dinner at Back Forty Grill in Heber City.
- We're looking at various small resorts to hold our 2023 trip, so watch the FWSA.org website for information.

2024 NORTH AMERICAN SKI WEEK RESORT PRESENTATIONS—COPPER MOUNTAIN OR TELLU-RIDE RESORT?

- Telluride and Copper Mountain Resorts will give presentations of their resorts at the Portland Convention.
- FWSA Councils have been invited to send 2 representatives to the resort presentations on Saturday morning. The resorts will "sell" their resorts on the amenities they offer and activities available in the area.

- Results of the Council voting for the resort destination and the Tour Operator recommendations from the interview process will be given to the Board of Directors for final decision at their July Board meeting. The 2024 destination will be announced shortly after the meeting.

Director Report **Public Affairs** By Lina Arnold, Vice President

The Far West Ski Association Public Affairs Program purpose is to present to the outside world the interests, activities, positions that are important to the Association and to our contingency of snowsports enthusiasts.

Consumer Advocacy/Trends

During the 2020-2021 winter season, skier visits in the U.S. totaled 59 million, ranking as the fifth best season on record. According to the National Ski Areas Association. The 2019-2020 winter season, effected heavily by COVID-19, saw 51.1 million visits. Even taking into account the challenges regarding reduced capacity, lift line management, ticket sales, food and beverage services, etc., 78% of ski areas said their season exceeded their expectations.

During the shortened 2019-2020 winter season, ski areas were open just 99 days. During 2020-2021 ski areas were open for 112 days. While an improvement, that number fell short of the average number of days ski areas operated during the 2018-2019 season, which was 121 days.

Area Development

Area development covers ski area expansion and enhancement, as well as proposed new areas. It also includes the debates that occur between the developers, the ski areas, and the environmentalists.

Squaw Valley/Alpine Meadows: The gondola project connecting the two resorts is moving forward. Alterra Mountain Company plans to invest \$207 million in capital at Steamboat, Deer Valley, SquawValley/Alpine Meadows, and Mammoth Mountain.

Aspen Skiing Company is proposing to expand the Aspen Mountain Ski Area into the Pandora's terrain.

Purgatory Resort, just north of Durango, CO, is working with the U.S. Forest Service to expand its skiable terrain.

Sunlight Mountain, Glenwood Springs, CO, has plans to build a new chairlift and expand expert terrain on the ski area's East Ridge.

Loveland Ski Area received the go-ahead to expand its beginner terrain and to add additional parking. Loveland Ski Area also got approval to offer guided snowcat tours in the Arapaho National Forest.

Steamboat Springs will be adding a new gondola, the longest 8 person gondola in North America.

Arapaho Basin has replaced two chairlifts, built a new Aerial Adventure Park, and installed radio-frequency identification ticket scanning gates.

Big Sky is preplacing their Swift Current quad chair with a new state of the art 6 person high speed chair, effectively increasing the uphill capacity out of the village by 50%.

Utah has a proposed brand new ski area, Mayflower Mountain Resort. It is located beyond the eastern border of Deer Valley Resort.

Safety

The overall purpose of the FWSA Safety program is to promote safety on and off the slopes to reduce snowsports injuries. January is National Safety Month. A program spearheaded by the National Ski Areas Association, the month of January is dedicated to an entire month of Safety. As you begin your snowsports adventure planning for the coming season, think about what you might be able to do for your ski club, your council, or your friends/family to promote a safer environment on the slopes.

Many resorts around the country participate in skier safety month, promoting safety and educating skiers and boarders about being safe and using common sense while on the slopes. You might consider checking in with your favorite resorts to see what sort of activities they might be offering to promote snowsports safety.

Committee Report Environment Program & Award by Fran Long, Chair

The purpose of the FWSA Environment Program is to encourage snowsports participants to take an active role in conserving and protecting our environment in our homes, communities, and mountains.

The Far West Ski Association Environment Award is graciously sponsored by Aspen/Snowmass, The Gant Aspen, and The Crestwood Condominium Hotel. Aspen/Snowmass, an early leader in the ski industry reducing their carbon footprint, proposed this award for FWSA in 2015.

The Environment Award is designed to inspire and reward creative efforts to conserve and protect our environment. This award should recognize a special action that the applicant took, or something he or she put in place that made an impact in the community. The Award is open to any individual who is a member of a Far West Ski Association club. See the FWSA website: www.fwsa.org, for a full description of the award guidelines and requirements.

The Environment Award recipient for 2019 is Janine Rands, a member of SLO Skiers in San Luis Obispo and Central Council of California. The recipient is awarded a ski package at Aspen/Snowmass including:

- 5 nights lodging for 2 split between The Gant Aspen and the Crestwood Condominiums in Snowmass and air transportation
- 5 days lift tickets for 2 at Aspen Mountain, Snowmass, Aspen Highlands and Buttermilk
- 5 days ski/board rentals for 2
- Half-day group lesson for 2

Unfortunately, there was no recipient of this award for 2022. Many of us do a variety of projects, have second-nature practices we do in our homes and communities to support our environment, and have multiple ideas of additional things we might do to affect a positive environment. Consider taking some of your current projects, or some of your environmental ideas, and applying for this award for 2023. Just do your best with the application, submit it to me, and I will work with you to make any improvements that will increase your chances of receiving the award. Start early, like now, to make sure you have everything in order prior to the awards deadline mid-March, 2023.


