cause it is still rated number one on the list of the world's best ski resorts. It's easy to like Zermatt, as it is home to 9 of the 10 highest mountains in Europe.

Skiing at Zermatt and Cervinia, also is a culinary experience. There are many highly rated restaurants right on the mountain that serve delicious food. In fact, reservations often were required. The Hotel Alex, where most of our group of 104 stayed, is an excellent historic hotel. Meals were delicious, rooms were well appointed, and the hotel had a very nice pool, hot tub and spa. Others stayed at the Gornergrat Hotel, less than a block from the train station. The lovely car-free pedestrian town of Zermatt offered plenty of shopping and nightly entertainment.

FWSA 2023 Ski Week Extension to Southern Spain and Mallorca was Much Fun

With 44 people on the extension trip to Costa del Sol, Southern Spain and Mallorca, our journey from Zermatt to Spain started with a flight from Zürich to Malaga, followed by bus transfer to the Meliá Costa del Sol hotel in Torremolinos. The Meliá is situated right on the beach waterfront and offered a promenade for strolling up and down the waterfront with numerous restaurants, cafes, and shops. We arrived in the afternoon; therefore, there were no scheduled tours and it was considered a free day, to explore this beautiful area.

The next morning, we boarded the bus for a 2 ½ hr. scenic ride to Granada. Upon arriving in Granada, we met our tour guides and embarked on about a 2-hour walking tour of the Alhambra Palace. The Palace was a huge infrastructure resembling a small city with many palaces and gardens. We were blessed with moderate temperatures that made walking the grounds

comfortable. Following the tour, we hiked down to the city of Granada and had free time for lunch and shopping.

The next day, we traveled by bus to Ronda. The bus ride was pleasant with scenery consisting of acres and acres of olive groves. It's no wonder that Spain produces a lot of olive oil. Upon arrival at Ronda, we were greeted by our tour guides (2) and proceeded on a walking tour of the city. We were in awe of how the city is built atop a mountain and the enormous valley that surrounded the city. Vistas were incredible, as were the various monuments and historic buildings. One particular building that stood out prominently was the corrida, or bullring, as Ronda is thought of as the birthplace of bullfighting. Following the tour we dined at a nearby restaurant for an excellent lunch, followed by our return trip to the Meliá Costa del Sol hotel.

Our last day in Torremolinos was a free day for touring, shopping, and dining. Although it was a free day, there was a scheduled walking tour to the Cathedral and then to city center for shopping and dining. Not everyone went on the tour, as there were several road warriors that rented bikes at the hotel for a little exploration of their own. The next day we were scheduled for a bus transfer to the Malaga airport for our flight to Palma, Mallorca.

The best of all activities was riding a historic train to the town of Sóller (pronounced *soyea*). This historic train with exquisitely refurbished cars meandered through the mountains to the town of Sóller. There we disembarked from the train and continued our journey on a tram that slowly weaved its way through the town until we arrived at the Port of Sóller. The weather was ideal with small cumulus clouds dotting the blue sky and warm temperatures; shorts and tees were the ideal outfit. A tour leader guided a few of us to a highpoint (yes, that means climbing stairs) at the coast where we had beautiful views of the Mediterranean Sea and high, steep cliffs. After a generous amount of free time, we marched around the marina to have a bountiful seafood lunch. Our bus returned us to the warm and inviting beachside at the Meliá Palma Bay hotel and provided our escape from this mini-Shangri-la.

Saturday was our last day to enjoy the city of Palma before heading north to Zürich for our flights home. In the morning, a guide led us on a walking tour towards La Seu, the Cathedral of Palma that took three hundred years to construct. We then continued on to the city center where we encountered a maze of streets, pathways, and plazas with shops, gelato cafes, and restaurants around every corner. There was plenty of free time for exploring and having lunch before walking the beachfront returning to the hotel.

Later that afternoon there was a Farewell Event so that everyone could gather around and talk about the trip, meet new acquaintances, and tell tall stories from the week's excursions. A buffet-style of cheeses, olives, meats, and small Mallorcan flatbread with veggie squares, and a variety of beverages were provided. Some considered this dinner; others ate lightly so they could go out for their Last Supper in Palma.

We all thoroughly enjoyed our Costa del Sol and Mallorca extension and would love to come back!

FWSA 2024 International Ski Week – Madonna di Campiglio, Italy

At the turn of the nineteenth century, European aristocrats discovered a wonderful place in the heart of the Dolomites, and Madonna di Campiglio became a sophisticated and elegant destination, whilst preserving its majestic and fascinating landscape of the Dolomites.

We are planning to go back to the

amazing Dolomites in late February, 2024. Madonna di Campiglio is the main point of access to the Dolomites mountain range. The resort is located in a valley between the scenic Dolomites and the Italian Alps with the ability to ski both. This vibrant Italian ski area links four small sectors known

both for excellent grooming and steep runs. The slopes spread out widely. The ski area has 57 lifts and 93 miles of ski runs with a capacity of more than 31,000 people per hour. A spectacular 16-minute gondola ride connects to the neighboring resort of Pinzolo.

Madonna di Campiglio is one of the world's classic ski centers and one of Italy's most famous ranking with Cortina, Courmayeur and San Martino. Considering its long history in winter sports, it has the benefit of an extensive and hugely enjoyable ski area with lifts coming right down into the town, unusual assets compared to many other famous ski resorts. The resort's altitude gives it more dependable



A survey was done at the Jackson Hole Ski Week to find out where participants wanted to go for the 2025 North American Ski Week and future Mini and Adventure trips. The results of the survey were presented to FWSA Board Members at their April meeting and decisions were made regarding the selection of destinations.

TRAVEL INSURANCE

FWSA recommends highly that trip participants purchase Travel Insurance when they go on one of the FWSA trips, e.g., North American Ski Week; International Ski Week; International Dive Trip; North American Mini Trip; North American and International Adventure Trips. We had 6 cancellations for the Jackson Hole Ski Week, and we were unable to replace the vacant spots with people on the wait list. The 6 participants didn't have travel insurance and lost all trip funds. Those with group air did get partial credit for future air.

Unexpected things can happen such as family getting sick, work schedule changes, death of work colleagues, or early season ski accidents. It's a small investment to protect your travel funds. The FWSA website lists some insurance products that you can consider, our online registration site will also give participants an option to purchase an insurance product from the Tour Operator, and you can do a search of travel insurance products on the website. There are many products based

The IKON PASS PRICES are going up, but it will include some new benefits.

With the start of the new year the full IKON Pass will provide access to multiple mountain destinations in eleven countries.

The IKON Passes for the 2023-2024 season for adults on the Full IKON Pass will be \$1,159 (\$1,539 CAD) and \$829 (\$1,099 CAD) for the Base Pass with blackout dates. For a limited time if you purchase early, you can get a discount of \$100 to the existing Full IKON pass, and a \$50 for the Base Pass.

The IKON Base Plus Pass provides access to 54 destinations; the Base Pass has 47.

The two-to four-day Session Passes to a resort will range from \$259 (\$339

CAD) to \$429 (\$569 CAD).

The Full IKON Child pass for kids ages 5-12 years old is \$369. The Base IKON Child Pass is \$299.

The price for young adults that are 13 – 22 will be \$519 for the IKON Base Plus. There is additional pricing for children under 4 years old, military, college, and nurses.

Families can save up to \$200 (\$280 CAD) on child passes for up to two children ages 5-12 with the purchase of any adult IKON pass.

Some of the new benefits are discounts on travel when you book with the IKON Pass Travel Service (<u>ikonpass.com</u>) and discounts from gear and apparel suppliers or a membership in Outside+. They will continue the friends and family discounts, pass deferment, food and beverage discounts, payment plan options, CMH Heli discounts, and membership in Protect Our Winters (POW).

Some access changes will be with Taos Ski Valley, NM, which moves from the Base Pass to Base Plus Pass, and will no longer require lift reservations. With an additional \$220 (\$290 CAD) from the IKON Base Pass, IKON Base Plus Pass holders get a five-day access to Taos.

Brand new-to-IKON passholders (full and Base) who buy early this spring get access this season to 13 Alterra resorts—some immediately upon purchase, others will have start dates during April. Unfortunately, buyers of the four-day Session Pass do not have spring 2023 access.

This report also has plenty of good runs for intermediate skiers; there are more conventional ski areas in the Chamonix Valley, five in total, although only the linked Le Brevent and La Flégère areas are directly accessible by ski lift from Chamonix itself; the others are separate and situated some distance away from the town but served by bus and/or train links. Getting to Chamonix is easy: it's just over an hour from Geneva airport. All snowsports enthusiasts should plan a pilgrimage to Chamonix to experience the magic of the Mont Blanc massif at least once. The town also has a

well-deserved reputation for lively nightlife.

Athletic Scholarship Chair

The Far West Ski Association Athletic Scholarship Program is in its 19th year, growing from an initial \$1,500 in scholarships in 2004 to \$9,050 and 14 recipients in the 2022-2023 season. The total awarded since the program's inception is over \$193,000 to 140 recipients. The program is designed to provide financial assistance to junior ski racers throughout the western United States where FWSA has a presence. Applicants must be junior alpine ski racers affiliated with the United States Ski and Snowboard (USSA) and must participate in racing programs in states where FWSA has regional councils. These include California, Oregon, Washington, Nevada, Arizona, Idaho, Utah, and Wyoming. Scholarships are awarded based on financial need, athletic performance, academic achievement, and community service.

Skiing is an expensive sport and the costs involved in ski racing cannot be left up to the parents alone to incur. For younger athletes, the cost is modest. However, for 16 through 20 year olds, where competition becomes national and even international, the costs can be significant. Without the help of outside resources, many junior racers

simply cannot compete. For a top competitor, expenses can reach \$20,000 per year. This is not a seasonal sport for these racers; it includes a full year of ski-related involvement. After the winter race competition has concluded, competitors engage in dryland training; then off to summer camps. Camps typically run about \$1,200 per week, not including transportation.

Winter training costs range from \$1,000-\$1,500 each season. Most applicants work part time to offset expenses. The demands on their time are significant. They must balance their time between training, competition, school, work, and community service. Despite these demands, the average GPA for these recipients consistently exceeds a 3.9 average. Our scholarships are modest compared to the need, but they do make a difference in the overall scope of the resources they require.

The funding of the scholarships comes from a number of sources: raffles, auctions, club and council partnerships, and direct contributions from club members, clubs, and councils. The FWSA has greatly benefitted from the generous support from its sponsors including *Whitefish Mountain Resort* <u>www.skiwhitefish.com</u>, a year round winter and summer resort; Kandahar Lodge, and Grouse Mountain Lodge in Whitefish, Montana; *Schure Sports, Inc.* <u>www.karbonmail.com</u>, maker of the Karbon line of snowsports apparel; the US Ski Team and the *Far West Racing Association.* Their contributions of vacation packages, snowsports apparel, and cash bring in approximately \$10,000 per year as raffle and auction proceeds, as well as direct cash donations.

In addition, our partnership program through clubs and councils affords us approximately one third of our scholarship funding each year. Finally, the *Far West Ski Foundation*

Unmasking the Hidden Plastic Menace: A Call for Sustainable Ski Resorts

As the 2022-2023 Western ski season draws to a close, I hope you had a great time! Now we look forward to our favorite summer activities - hiking, rock climbing, cycling, or swimming in mountain lakes, then heading back to the campsite. Summer vacation to the Sierra Mountains will be a little different with snow levels at recordbreaking 41-87 feet of snow, a staggering 189% above the 52-year 22foot average. Mammoth Mountain Ski Area reported 58 ft at the main lodge and 87 ft at the summit, and new reports welcome skiing into July! But under this massive amount of snow and soon to be melted is a graveyard of discarded trash. The recreational community must address the threat lurking beneath the snow-capped slopes – plastics – the human link.

As snow and ice melts, plastics degrade by the sun and climate exposure. Plastics like food packaging and synthetic textiles break down into microscopic bits that infiltrate the ecosystem. Scientists at the Desert Research Institute in Reno are studying the effects of microplastics in snow, and to probe how microplastics get into snowflakes and, ultimately our water supply. Theories include how wind may sweep the particles from the ocean to the clouds where they attach to rain and snow; that washing and drying synthetic fibers get into the water and air; and everyday items like tarps, plastic water bottles, and industrial paints disintegrate from exposure to the elements.

Last year, California became the first government in the world to require water agencies to test for microplastics. But we can't rely solely on government action to address this problem. Our ski resorts need to take a bold step towards zero-waste in every area, starting with the food courts who use plastic cutlery, straws, cups, and condiment packages. Italian ski resorts in the Pejo Val di Sole and Trentino regions aggressively challenged the use of plastics in 2019 after microplastics from ski equipment, clothing and plastic bags were found in nearby glaciers. They've banned plastic bottles, bags, disposable cutlery, and even packets of ketchup and mayonnaise.

Every ski resort in the United States needs to address their "plastic footprint" to what is served and sold. We applaud that many resorts have started a change to reusables, but others need to get on board. Start at the food courts and bars: switch to washable dishes, glassware and cutlery; all drinks sold are in aluminum recyclable containers; plastic straws and cutlery be changed out to 100% biodegradable choices; condiments available in refillable dispensers and eliminate all single-use options.

The Far West Ski Association can play an instrumental role in urging its 12 member states to recognize the urgent importance of removing plastic products from their resorts. As the new Environment Chair, I will begin to find ways to address the use of plastics in our mountain resorts. It's a big task, but we can start by forming a FWSA action team from each state to tackle this issue. Ski Club members can work on one area for change at your favorite ski resort and apply for the lucrative Environment Award 2023 -24!

As you head out to recreate this summer, take a look at your plastic footprint and replace everything with a reusable item. Pack your own cup, spoon, plate, and napkin, and remember the "leave no trace" principles. Let's ensure that our mountains remain pristine playgrounds for generations to come, free from the menace of plastic waste.

FWSA History Program Changes Helm

John Watson had held this position since the inception of the program, and we extend our deep appreciation to John for his many years of service and development of the current recognition programs in the history portfolio. The Ski Club/ Council history program began in the early 2000's under the then President, Mike Sanford.

There were four key reasons to develop a history program:

- To expose or educate members to have over 50 years of service to • the dynamic history of their sport.

- To provide opportunities for research into snowsports history.

The deadline for the entries to the Western Ski Heritage Award, Ski Club/Council History Recognition, and Historic Club, Councils, Ski Patrol & Ski School programs was March 27, 2023, and submissions were received for all three programs

this year. A special thank you goes to Joe Harvis, VP of Communications and Chris Gill, VP of Council Services, to "get the word out" regarding all the recognition programs available to the clubs and councils. The history recognitions will be awarded at the FWSA's Annual Convention this June in Boise. Idaho.

At the November Board of Directors Meeting, the Board of Trustees recommended and the Board of Directors subsequently approved submission for the nomination of Charles "Chuck" Morse and John Watson to the U.S. Ski Hall of Fame, and these submittals magazines, photographs, and ephemare in progress. Both candidates snowsports. Chuck was the first full time Recreational Services Director hired by a division of the U.S. Ski Association (now U.S. Ski and Snowboard) and served as Executive Director in the 1970's. John Watson is a FWSA Past President and reanimated the Far West Ski Foundation and served as its President from 2009 -2022.

SAFETY FIRST! INTRODUCTION OF THE NATIONAL SKI PATROL SAFETY TEAM

First and foremost. I want to thank Far West Ski Association for my recent appointment as the FWSA National Ski Patrol Liaison. The last incumbent of this position was Mr. Ron Anderson an NSP Legend. I met Ron in the 1990s and was first introduced to FWSA by Jane Wyckoff who is a FWSA long time volunteer. Having just become an Emergency Medical Technician, Ron was the person who motivated me to join the National Ski Patrol in 1999. I am truly honored to once again be part of this amazing organization and board of directors. I am humbled and excited to fill some very big boots in the coming years.

The induction of the NSP Safety Team is somewhat new to the education programs that are the foundation of the National Ski Patrol.

MISSION: The National Ski Patrol Safety Team is an industry leader in the promotion and education of outdoor recreational safety. The Team upholds the National Ski Patrol's mission and core values.

VISION: The National Ski Patrol Safety Team will be a leading authority in promoting safety in outdoor sporting activities and events.

I have been appointed as the NSP Safety Team Member Representative at my home resorts Bear Mountain and • Snow Summit in San Bernardino Mountains in Big Bear, California. Wayne Wong is our Team Leader for the 12 members representing the resorts located in the NSP Southern California Region. We have monthly team meetings and lessons we share with our patrollers. As patrollers we need to establish a connection with our guests and bring the calm which eliminates chaos. This leads to hope which helps to focus on positive outcomes in scary situations. We are being taught various coping skills and methods to assist in handling the feelings and emotions during physical and emotional trauma, stress, anguish, and distress. These coping skills can then be shared by patrollers with our injured and ill resort guests in times of pain, fear, and uncertainty while out on the hill and in our base patrol rooms.

As a member of the NSP Safety Team we have specific responsibilities to uphold:

- Promotion of safety for patrollers, resort employees and the public
- Representation of division interests to national committees
- Distribution of safety items
- Promotion of Safety Week and Safety Month
- Collaboration with PSIA/AASI, NSAA and regional ski associations to achieve and maintain consistent safety messaging.
- Promotion and support of NSP programs, events, and initiatives
- Promotion and support of NSP and Safety Team sponsors
- Support of safety awareness issues and trends within the Snowsports and bike industries

One of the NSP Safety Team initiatives for the 2022-2023 seasons is to share the NEWLY ADOPTED 2022 SKIERS RESPONSIBILITY CODE ~ Why a New Code? NSAA first developed the Skier Responsibility Code in 1962. In the last 60 years, the Code has undergone several revisions to stay in step with modern language and skiing behavior (and to include snowboarders, bikers and everyone who enjoys the slopes!). The 2022 version of Your Responsibility Code has grown from seven points to 10. The pre-existing seven points were revised, sometimes minimally, to modernize the language. One previous point was split into two. Two new points were added: one, to emphasize the importance of not skiing or riding under the influence of alcohol/drugs; another to let skiers and riders know what to do when you get into a collision or other on-mountain incident. This season, ski areas across the country will begin to adopt this language. However, it takes some time to make new signage and get everyone on the same page! You can expect to see this 2022 Code used more widely over the next three seasons. In the meantime, take a moment to read this Code; talk with your kids or friends who are new to the slopes; and remember that staying in control is the best way to stay safe on the slopes.

I look forward to sharing more information and the initiatives of the National Ski Patrol to promote safety and wellness for our patrollers and guests.

YOUR RESPONSIBILITY CODE

- Always stay in control. You must be able to stop or avoid people or objects.
- 2 People ahead or downhill of you have the right-of-way. You must avoid them.
- **3** Stop only where you are visible from above and do not restrict traffic.
- 4 Look uphill and avoid others before starting downhill or entering a trail.
- 5 You must prevent runaway equipment.
- 6 Read and obey all signs, warnings and hazard markings.
- 7 Keep off closed trails and out of closed areas.
- 8 You must know how and be able to load, ride and unload lifts safely. If you need assistance, ask the lift attendant.
- **9** Do not use lifts or terrain when impaired by alcohol or drugs.
- 10 If you are involved in a collision or incident, share your contact information with each other and a ski area employee.

Know and Obey the Code. It's Your Responsibility.

2022-2023 SEASON

16 US fatalities

The Colorado Avalanche Information Center (CAIC) maintains the database of record on avalanche deaths in the United States.

With the unusual amount of snow this season, especially on the west coast, we may see even higher fatalities from avalanches this season. However, the season is not over yet. Some resorts in the Sierra have received over 50 feet of snow so far. As you can see from the charts, there were no avalanche fatalities, either last season or the present season, among skiers and borders who stayed inbounds.

My advice is to ski inbounds and also avoid skiing in the trees. With the abundance of snow, tree wells are even more

dangerous. Ski with a buddy and stay in touch. If you are set on skiing through the backcountry, bring the appropriate avalanche gear, including a shovel, beacon and probe. Also, avoid going alone. Approximately 150 people are killed each year in avalanches around the world. Let someone know where you will be skiing in advance and touch base with them often. Stay Safe.
