



INTRODUCTION

Memorializing Rusty Bindings' extraordinary 50-year history was meant to be. As if by destiny, eleven large vintage photo albums and two ragged file boxes crammed with old newsletters were literally *handed to me*. In the summer of 2019, I was their fourth home in less than a year. It had been discussed that all that old stuff be scanned, discarded, and continue as computer files. The aging, original paper records, could have been gone forever. But instead, they survived and were stacked next to my desk. Until this book was finished, it seemed like the albums and boxes were staring at me demanding my attention.

The more old photos I viewed, the more old newsletters I read, and the more details I researched, the more amazed I became at RB's incredible past. Between 1983 and 2021, RB won 30 of 38 Singles League Ski Championships. This included a winning streak of 15 straight years from 1999 through 2013. During 1984 through 1993, RB was designated five times the "Most Outstanding Recreational Ski Club" in the U.S. by the USRSA. RB truly was a ski dynasty.

And that's just the skiing part. During its 50 years, RB averaged more than 150 activities per annum. Most of the club's activities were not ski related. In the 1990s and 2000s RB averaged more than 220 events per year or almost 20 events a month. All this hyperactivity equates to an astounding 7500 events in 50 years. From 1971 to 2021, not only did RB do more than any other ski club, but so much of it was wild and unique. This book covers forty different RB topics. Most of the topics are fully illustrated with photos and fliers. Deservingly, lists, tables, and commentary of the presidents and the boards fill 19 pages. All 265 board members in RB's history are listed.

Most everything written in the book was derived from the newsletters. The rest came from a few old newspaper articles or were told to me by credible past members. The book is 100 pages by design. Some activities and events are not in the book for lack of space and documented details. Anything printed in italics are unedited words copied from the newsletters. Authors are always recognized. The Prologue superbly describes RB's social interactions and rewards. Every effort was made to describe RB's history as it was.

Rusty Bindings, decade by decade, has surpassed its toughest competition in skiing, activities, and consistent membership. Because of Rusty Bindings' national ski successes, remarkable number and variety of activities, and solid documentation of its history, I believe a strong argument can be made that RB was the most outstanding recreational ski club in America from 1971 -2021. THE PROOF IS HEREIN.

PROLOGUE Finding Community In Rusty Bindings

After several years of a happily single existence, keeping up with family, and friends from my married life, plus a couple of chapters with sweet romantic partners, I still felt something missing. What would make this happy picture more complete? I envisioned a community of single friends enjoying lives more fitting with my own solo course. Where are they? I wondered. How would I find them? I didn't know the first thing about how to locate these potential compadres, or if they existed at all.

Resolving to find out, I enlisted a likeminded friend to the task and we started digging around. We researched singles activity clubs within a 30-mile radius. After some weeks (this was before Meetup.com) our sleuth abilities seemed to pay off. We discovered a group that had some potential. It was a long-standing, established singles ski club called Rusty Bindings, described on the webpage as an 'activities based club for singles aged 21 and older'. Initially I feared the group was too young, but the photos revealed mature folks with greying hair, smiling from ear to ear, posing on the wintery slopes of Tahoe. The actual age of its membership now trends over 50 years and well beyond.

RB held general meetings for the membership every week at The Greenery in

Walnut Creek. I was encouraged, but also cautiously optimistic. The reputations of some singles social clubs were sketchy. They were 'meat markets' for the lonely and hyper-aroused singles of the boomer set. Folks would cruise the parties looking for their latest hook up or brief infatuation. There was high turnover as people constantly moved on to newer, more novel venues. Creating community, and finding lasting love, was clearly not part of the general equation.

Still, one Halloween evening, while feeling curious and adventurous, I decided to dress up in a curvy but demure 'merry widow' costume, complete with long lacy black dress, gloves and veil, and drop in on this ski group's annual costume party. Though not highly publicized, the soiree took place at their usual meeting bar/bistro venue, which was also open to the public. Under the protection of my costume persona, I found a seat at the bar overlooking the dance floor and ordered a glass of Chardonnay. I sipped, and watched, trying to look confident, cool and deeply interested in the goings on. Like a cultural anthropologist, I studied their social behaviors for clues. Will they fit my 'new community' ideal?

What I observed that evening was surprising. The room was buzzing with vibrant, joyful individuals celebrating and laughing with one another, radiating a vibe of easy familiarity of the kind that only shared history brings. This was not a typical nightclub scene. These people cared about each other, and I soon felt comfortable being among them by myself. I could foresee my future as part of this active, fun-



loving cohort. As I nursed my glass of wine, sitting near the live music, a couple of affable club members came up and introduced themselves.

Before long we were all on the dance floor, moving to familiar Motown sounds. That night, I had experienced a warm feeling of safety and acceptance from the beginning to the end. As a researcher of single life at a certain age, I had struck gold.

In the weeks that followed, I found the time to drive to meetings on a somewhat irregular basis, learning more about this group and what it had to offer its membership. The main emphasis is skiing and ski racing, followed by various other outdoors activities, social events, and charity fundraisers planned throughout the year. In this busy chapter, one or two events are planned every week for any and all who wish to participate. I showed up at a couple of activities that interested me, and my attraction to the club and its people grew from there. I made acquaintances and then true friends. I eventually served on the Board of Directors as our membership continued to grow. I've seen people come

and go, but mainly stay...and over the past several years have come to realize how this friendly unassuming group has profoundly changed my life. The women became my sisters, the men my brothers. Never would I have imagined that I would start developing deep, lifelong friendships at this stage! After living abroad, raising and launching two great kids; coming out of a decades-long marriage; and navigating a major career change -- this life is an astonishing revelation. I had assumed that most significant life events were behind me.

If there ever was a poster child for life beyond our 50s and 60s, (and even 70s!) it is I. Although my calendar was sufficiently busy even before I discovered this community, the ensuing days and nights have been further enriched over the many seasons of skiing, hiking, camping, cycling, dancing and holiday parties. Yes, there are still the serial daters, and some cruisers, looking for a quick hook up, but where else does one see fifteen friends show up at 8:30 am on a Saturday to help a fellow member move house?

The stalwart support and love I received during my own brief but serious brush with cancer only confirmed these relationships as heartwarmingly genuine. I cannot imagine these people not being in my life.

I have tremendous gratitude for Rusty Bindings and all the wonderful people who have been key to its success over all these years.

THE BEGINNING OF RUSTY BINDINGS 1971

Rusty Bindings was started by three handsome, young ski bums in the fall of 1971. They thought it would be fun to get together to go skiing so they put the word out and started having meetings at the apartment complex where one of them lived on Oak Grove Road in Concord. The rumors are that it also was to meet hot young women. Little did they know how much that dream would come true!


As the group grew, they needed a larger meeting place. They moved to Michael Anthony's, a restaurant in Concord that actually was a swimming pool at one time. They named themselves the Mt. Diablo Singles Skiers and officially became a club on November 23, 1971. Unchallenged, Ralph Marsh, Steve Johnston, and Arlene Arnold nominated themselves the first president, treasurer, and secretary. Also, during the fall of 1971, a Singles League was created for ski competition and other activities for singles.

The new club's first ski competition was the Singles' League Race on January 27, 1972. The club's fledgling racers were led by expert freestyle skier, Dave "Shave" Shelton. Although no championships were won until 1983, a ski juggernaut was born. Eleven years later and over the following four decades, Rusty Bindings would go on to be the most dominant midsize singles' ski club on the West coast.

From the beginning this was to be no ordinary singles club – it required a unique, symbolic, catchy name. In June 1972, the Club was officially renamed Rusty Bindings Ski Club. It's still a mystery why they chose "Rusty Bindings." It completed its first election of nine board members: president, vice-president, past president, administrative director, treasurer, secretary, activities director, social director, and Far West rep. The first boardies were 20 and 30somethings. Annual dues were a budgetwise \$12. THE RUSTY BINDINGS STORY HAD BEGUN!

"Mt. Diablo Singles Skiers" officially organized itself on November 23, 1971. By March, the first Board of Directors had four officers and nine committee positions. Membership was limited to 125. In June 1972, the Club was officially incorporated and renamed "Rusty Bindings Ski Club."

President Gus Hanselin writes in June 1991: As your past Secretary, I've had occasion to look through some of the old documents from years gone by. Of particular interest are the minutes from the very first recorded meeting, which was held on November 23, 1971. Reading these minutes, it's apparent that other less formal meetings preceded this one. But it was at this meeting that the first official attempt to establish a ski club occurred. It was at this meeting that temporary officers were elected.

Barnyard skiing scheduled

It's barnyard skiing time Saturday, Nov. 8 at 2 p.m. at 60 Amigo Lane in Walnut Creek.

That's when the Rusty Bindings Ski Club and Erling Wiig, president of Ski Arena Inc., have scheduled a skiing exhibition on pulverized ice, straw, feathers and dirt.

Wiig said, "This will be a charity event and will send underprivileged kids to the ski country this season. Benefactor will be the Martinez Boys Club."

A \$2.50 donation is asked. Wiig added, "It is hoped the public, skier and non-skier alike, will come and watch the show. The entertainment will include freestyle skiing, jumping and slaloms, as well as skijoring, which will utilize horses." Children who are selected for a trip to the Sierras will practice at Ski Arena Corral Mountain before attacking the cold weather slopes.

Rusty Bindings Ski Club is a singles only group which conducts meetings at Michael Anthony's Restaurant in Concord every Tuesday at 8 p.m. during the winter season. The club is a member of the Far West Ski Association and advocates greater skiing safety and development of skiing in general according to Rod Carpenter.

Wiig hopes to develop an indoor arena in the Walnut Creek area in the near future. He began skiing at the age of 5 in his native Norway. He came to the United States as a young man and has amassed some 50 years of experience in snow, water, sand, pulverized ice and pine needle surface skiing.

He made the film, "Barnyard Skiing," in Hollywood 25 years ago. It is still shown frequently at meetings of Bay Area ski clubs.

RB'S 1974-75 SNOW SKIING IN WALNUT CREEK

Rusty Bindings used real snow to hold a ski exhibition in a city where it never snows. That marked the start of what would be a half century of RB's ski club infamy. No other ski club in Singles League would win as often and have more fun than Rusty Bindings. And this unusual ski exhibition aptly demonstrated RB's propensity for creative, unusual activities.

Dave Shelton, RB's third President, came up with the idea of a ski exhibition in Walnut Creek. Dave and ski promoter Erling Wiig organized the Barnyard Skiing Exhibition on Wiig's property in Walnut Creek. Wiig had produced a Hollywood movie in 1950 named "Barnyard Skiing." The ski exhibition would be similar to scenes from the movie. Erling erected the temporary "Ski Arena Corral" and charged a \$2.50 admission to watch top-notch freestyle skiing, jumping and slaloms. In the second year, skijoring was added. Skijoring involves a horse pulling a skier around a makeshift track of snow. The Exhibition would also be a charity event to benefit underprivileged children at the Martinez Boys Club. This was RB's first recorded charity event.

If you can't go to the snow, we'll bring the snow to you. Five local firms donated about five tons of pulverized ice to cover a 200' oval track on a large, mostly empty lot in the southwest edge of Shell Ridge. A hybrid imitation snow called polysnow would also be added to the course. The slope would rise about 30 feet. Two dozen RBers formed a fire brigade-like line to empty 70 pound bags of snow around the small course. After teams of skiers flattened the snow by side-stepping around the course, THE SHOW BEGAN.

1970s SNOW KINGS & QUEENS

Dave Shelton, President, 1973-74 writes: "The Snow Queen and King contests were fairly big deals in the early and mid 70s. BAC winners reigned over the San Francisco Ski Show at the Cow Palace. RB was just a newbie to the BAC and did not make a lot of good impressions early in the BAC racing circuit. However, in 73-74 the RB Snow Queen candidate, Laurie Miller won the BAC Snow Queen contest and helped put RB on the map. She then went down to Disneyland with RB's Diane Prouty, Dave Costa and myself where she competed in the FWSA Snow Queen competition. Two years later I was the RB King candidate and also won the BAC competition. Criteria included a formal and ski attire walk through, skiing ability, club participation and an interview. My trip to FWSA was also unsuccessful but RB had made an impression on the Singles League and Bay Area Council."



THE TUESDAY GENERAL MEETINGS

For RB's first four decades, the Tuesday meetings would be its main source of information for Club events, signing up for activities, collection of fees, and meeting and greeting new and existing members. Then, as more and more people used the internet for information and communicating, the attendance at the Tuesday meetings slowly dwindled and COVID all but ended the meetings in 2020.

Beginning in 1971, RB's first meetings were held twice a month on a Tuesday in a brick walled apartment complex clubhouse on Oak Grove Road in Concord. In 1972 the Tuesday meetings were moved to Michael Anthony's Restaurant in Concord and held almost every Tuesday.

As the young, raucous membership grew, RB needed a bigger romper room. In 1976 the club moved to El Papagallo Restaurant in Walnut Creek on the corner of Ygnacio Valley road and Oak Grove Road (now a Walgreens). That would be base camp for the next twelve years. By 1988, the Tuesday meetings were held every week except during the summer when there were outdoor BBQs on alternating Tuesdays.

During the 80s and 90s members would meet after the Tuesday night meetings at

WPLJ's for dancing and small talk, and later go for the after hours \$1.99 special at Stanfords in downtown Walnut Creek.

During 1989-91, the Tuesday meetings were held for about a year at the HMS Endeavor Restaurant, Walnut Creek, and then the next year at the Tommy T's on Willow Pass Road, Concord. In 1991 RB relocated to the idyllic Greenery Restaurant that overlooks Heather Farms Park in Walnut Creek. Always an ambassador for RB, avid golfer Stevie Bales utilized his friendship with the Greenery owner and arranged for rent-free Tuesday meetings.

From 1991 until 2017 the Tuesday general meetings were held in the Greenery's smaller of two banquet rooms. For 26 years it was an ideal situation for RB -- parking was free, it had a Cheers-like bar environment, and it served as the home course for the Rusty Putters and many of their golf tournaments. In addition, for a quarter century this was RB's go-to establishment for many RB holiday-themed parties and a variety of other gatherings.

Of the many different Tuesday meeting spots over 50 years, half have been at the Greenery, where RB developed VIP status with the owner, bar tenders, and waitresses.

In 2016 the Greenery began a two-year remodeling project. For the next 24 months the Greenery was mostly closed-down except for its kitchen and an outdoor, tentcovered dining area in the parking lot. The Club's Tuesday gatherings needed another space.

RB relocated to the Tower Grill in downtown Danville until COVID unfortunately stopped all RB gatherings in 2020. The Tower Grill also was the staging point for RB's popular Monday night bike rides.


THE SUMMER TUES BBQs 1980-2021

Sometime around 1980 RB started having Tuesday eve summer BBQs at Rodger Smith Park off Grayson Road in Pleasant Hill. It was a quaint, small neighborhood park. The initial motivation was to meet to play volleyball. The Tues BBQs were every other week from June through September. That bi-weekly, very social tradition continues today.

In 2005 RB relocated the Tuesday BBQ a couple of miles down the road to the picnic area of the mega-recreational Pleasant Hill Park on Gregory Lane. Volleyball continued until 2012 when PH Park replaced the volleyball area with more picnic facilities.

The highlight of the Tues BBQs has been the potlucks which often produced dozens of home-cooked dishes often equal to some of the finest restaurants. The reputation of a first-class social event during sundown spread far and wide. This RB event is responsible for more new RB members than all other Club events combined. The Tuesday BBQs continue today. 50 YEARS OF TGIF's

For all of RB's 50 years it has met for TGIFs. This unwavering ritual has occurred mostly at bars and restaurants but also in members' homes. RB has likely held, at least once, a TGIF at every well-known watering hole along the 680 corridor from Martinez to San Ramon. Walnut Creek, RB's hometown by default, has been the most go-to city.



RBers gathered at Mexican Restaurant El Charro's, Lafayette, 1-2 times a year for almost five decades.

By far, potluck TGIF's in members' homes have always been the most popular Friday rendezvous. During the summer, the outdoor settings combined with lots of personal dishes and BYOB, would often draw a quarter to a half of the Club's membership.

In May, 1983 Social Director Bob Pushwa writes: "The TGIF at Charlie Gringos on April 8 brought 30 thirsty RB together for a fabulous taco bar and BIG margaritas. Surprisingly (?) many of those in attendance were racers sharpening their skills for next days show-down Race #5 at Bear valley."

In February, 1995 Social director Sandy Lawson writes: *"Please join in the fun and hoopla at Lyons Brewery in Dublin on Friday February 10. Folks start to arrive around 6-6:30 and the beer starts to flow. Lyons has a 41 foot bar, live music, dancing, pool tables, darts, shuffle board and more beers on draft than you could possibly drink."*

In February, 2005, Dave Weiner wrote: *"Want to put some pizzazz into the start of your weekend. Want to meet some great new friends, kick-up your heels, and do* some great dancing, enjoy some late happyhour hors d'oeuvres, then I have the place for you. Meet us at FORLI RISTORANTE & BAR. The two person band is called TAKE 2. So put some pizzazz into your weekend and join us."

In August, 2014 Social Director Debi Clancy writes: "August is filled with activities, activities, activities!!!! The outdoor Friday night concerts continue every Friday at the Blackhawk Plaza. The TGIF will be there on August 5th. Start the night off listening to TAINTED LOVE and follow with drinks/food at the Prickly Pear in the Blackhawk Plaza. They have a great outdoor area overlooking the pond.





During the years of 2010 – 2019, Paul & Kassey King hosted multiple TGIF's at their hilltop home with its panoramic views of Walnut Creek. And, on at least two occasions, RBers were serenaded by the guitars of Paul, Kassey, and their guitar strumming friends.

Attendance to RB TGIFs began to fade around 2015 as the flood of Meetup groups offered an almost unlimited variety of things to attend on Fridays. And, as more and more RBers retired, meeting on Fridays to celebrate the end of the work week lost its appeal.



RUSTY BINDINGS DURING COVID Creme de la Creme

2020 was one for the Rusty Bindings History Book – unquestionably the most challenging of its 50 years. For three decades RB had averaged more than 200 activities a year. In March, it all skidded to a standstill from COVID's shelter-in-place order. Overnight the "East Bay's Most Active Singles Club" was inactive. It was the equivalent of house arrest.

"The greatest ability is adaptability" and RB morphed from a very busy outdoor activities and social club into a very busy indoor virtual activities and social club. Overnight, Rusty TGIF's relocated from local restaurants to the Zoom cafe. Surprisingly during COVID, TGIF attendance increased. Equally impressive was the adjustment of our well-attended indoor/outdoor events to well-attended Zoom events.

While looking for new and different Zoom activities during the middle of the

pandemic, in August 2020, I looked for ideas on the websites of the Bay Area's other 12 ski clubs. Surprisingly, only three other ski clubs (Apres, In-Skiers, Snowdrifters) each had one upcoming event scheduled. The remaining clubs had naught. And what about the other ski clubs throughout northern California? When NorCal's other 11 clubs were surveyed, only the 49er and Fresno ski clubs had an event scheduled. It was obvious – **during COVID RB truly was crème de la crème**.

Following is a small sample of RB events during the 13 months of COVID – March 2020 through March 2021.

MARCH 2020



Within a couple of weeks of the initial "shelter-in-place" order, Rusty Bindings held its first Zoom TGIF. It would go on to hold a TGIF almost every Friday through the pandemic. The friendly, chatty weekly gathering discussed topics A-Z, watched videos, played games, and often had live singing and music. Photos of recent outdoor walks and hikes were shared at the TGIFs. We were living vicariously through the activities of other members.

APRIL 2020




During an April Zoom and throughout the pandemic, TGIF participants enjoyed some of the best acts of RB's infamous 2011-2014 Gong Shows. One of the most hilarious was the "Synchronized Swimming" act from 2013. Just like the original performance, applause filled the Zoom room. RB was so fortunate to have a treasure chest of their own quality entertainment.

MAY 2020

Peter, Paul, and Mary (aka Paul King, Kasey Dolan, and Jim McCormack) performed individually and as a group during several Zoom TGIFs. THE AWARDS & SPRING BANQUETS 1973 - 2018

It was called the annual awards banquet from 1973-1996, and then renamed the spring banquet from 1997-2018. In 2019 the banquet was discontinued for austerity reasons. RB has held their annual banquets at multiple locations along and around the 680 corridor from Antioch to Pleasanton. The first RB Awards Banquet was held in 1973 at El Papagallo Restaurant located at the corner of Oak Grove and Ygnacio Valley Road.

The annual Awards/Spring Banquets were always a dress-to-impress affair where retiring boardies were acknowledged and new boardies recognized. It was the official changing of the guard. In the 70s RB's ski awards were sparse, and dubious distinction awards were common. As RB began dominating Singles League competition skiing awards became the Banquet's central theme. During the late 80s and throughout the 90s dozens of skiing trophies, plaques, pins and other awards would be distributed to what seemed like almost everyone in attendance.

All RB awards banquets have included dancing. At the 2002 banquet RB hired for the first time a band -- the Brother Buzz Band. Live bands would play at all subsequent spring banquets until the banquets were discontinued in 2019.



Renting a facility and hiring a band continued every year afterwards. Many of the holiday parties after 2000 included a "Toys For Tots" collection, gift exchanges, and

occasionally Santa would appear. In 2008 Santa appeared with Rudolph.



For 26 years RB held an annual Bachelor & Bachelorette Auction as a charity fundraiser. The B/B's raised \$1000 to \$3000 each year. Historically, except for the 2011-14 Gong Shows, the annual B/B Auctions were RB's single biggest event each year involving more than 40 members as dates, organizers, event workers, and solicitors of donations. Typically, the B/B took 3 months to produce. Overseeing the B/B was an undertaking that no one wanted to do twice. Consequently, it ended in 2015.



RB'S GONG SHOWS 1982-87, 2011-14

In 1982 RB decided to have a Gong Show to mimic the crazy antics of the popular 1976 – 1980 weekly Gong Show starring Chuck Barris. Whereas the TV show was a socalled talent show, the RB version clearly would be a no-talent knock-off. In fact, a real, metal gong would be RB's only resemblance to Chuck Barris' production.

RB rented a backroom and stage at the El Papagallo Restaurant. Burgundy colored drapes were hung ceiling to floor as a backdrop. Act by act, RB members performed humiliating stunts in hopes of avoiding the dreaded low, metallic sounding 'gonnng' of the gong. Rumors are that the first RB Gong Shows were so lacking in talent that acts won by being less bad. After the 1987 Gong Show the Club's powers-to-be had had enough and "the show mustn't go on."

2011 – RB Gong Show Returns. Early in 2011 at a secret late night meeting, the

Gong Show was resurrected by Bruce Duncan and Brian O'Reilly – both survivors of RB's '80's Gong Shows. Having learned from their previous chagrins, the remake would include real theatrical venues, celebrity judges, a producer and director, and have acts that survived tryouts. Ambitiously, reserved seating would be sold in advance and half the proceeds would go to a charity. Over the four years the resurrected Gong Shows raised almost \$5000 for local charities.


Of the 100s of activities during RB's half century, the Gong Show was by far its biggest production. Event planning and expenditures started six months in advance. Ideas for acts and its performers also began months in advance. The number of acts at each show varied from 15 -19 and involved 30-50 members. Notably, the 2011- 14 Gong Shows were the only activities in RB's illustrious history where the public paid to see RB members perform.

First Rusty Binding's Dive & Dine – Salt Point State Park 1975

DIVE & DINES 1975 - 2017

The annual pilgrimage to Northern California's spectacular coastline became RB's most popular camping trip. It began in RB's third year and continued every year until it was cancelled in 2019 due to the restricted abalone season by the California Fish and Game Commission. The weekend along Highway 1 on the Mendocino coast had something for everyone: bike rides, walks, ocean walks, horseback riding, massages, gallery tours, kayaking, shopping, music by the campfire, and most of all, getting to know one another.

<u>Tom Jones (Newsletter Editor) writes in</u> <u>1984,</u> "You know you are coming down with Dive & Diness when you start maneuvering to get the Friday before off work (even if you have started a new job). As the affliction progresses, you find that you are able to remember only parts of Friday night and, unfortunately, <u>all</u> of Saturday! You know when the affliction is in recession when you arrive home on Sunday smelling like a campfire with three layers of dirt on your body to contend with. The divers came through again to provide us with enough abalone to feed half of Contra Costa."





The early years of Dive & Dine required lots of Coleman stoves and garage sale old pots and pans to feed the masses. Around 1990, enter Tim Peterson and Ma Baker (a.k.a. Lurline & Tim's mother). Like magic chefs they provided an entire portable kitchen with catering equipment. Gone was huddling around scores of overused camping stoves. Exquisite outdoor dining had arrived. In the 90s, some Dive & Dines would provide gourmet food to more than 150 people in the middle of nowhere.

Of course, such extraordinary feats are what Singles League legends are made of. While the lesser clubs were serving hot dogs, hamburgers, and deli potato salad, the infamous Championship Ski Team was dining to five-star meals of abalone.

Tim Peterson (Newsletter Editor) writes in 2008: THE ABALONE TRADITION

As June 1 strolls around, one's thoughts turn to abalone. I think not only of the animal itself but the entire tradition and the Northern California coast, the winding Highway 1, the wild flowers that blanket the hillsides, the exhilaration that you feel as you glimpse the coast line for the first time after the long winter, the setting up of camp and the camaraderie that is shared by those who make the pilgrimage; the struggling into the wet suit that fit last season and launching of the tubes and boats and finally that first plunge into salty water with the rush of cold, and all this in the name of abalone!

For those who have been, you know of what I speak. For those of you who are new, you are in for a pleasant surprise. Yes, the abalone, a mere gastropod, is the excuse and lender of its name to this tradition but the people are what make this tradition special. This is a tradition that is passed on from generation to generation, from father to son, buddy to buddy, family to family, instructor to student. No matter how the tradition is passed, the scene is a familiar one. If Mother Ocean is generous, the hunters return with plenty of abalone for the planned feast. A celebratory beer is in order, to wash away the salt and to recap the dive. Then, it's off to the cleaning area where one of the great ab secrets is revealed--pearls! Then another great secret is divulged, the best way to slice the ab to quarantee its tenderness.

If I were to continue and let all the secrets out of the bag, then it might destroy the tradition. Preparation and cooking are half of the fun, and everyone gets involved. The pounders pound, the eggers egg, the breaders bread, and cooks cook, and the server serve until everyone has overeaten the "best" meal ever. Later, the camp fire beckons and places are taken, stories and jokes are told and songs are sung. Thus, the tradition is once again renewed and passed. Join us for a weekend of diving fun, food and tradition.






OUR LUAU WAS A SUCCESS By Allison Muller, Singles League Rep. (93)

To most of the Rusty Ducks this activity was the most thrilling because it was the most risky. What other group endeavor requires a safety briefing of basic rafting before embarking?

The Rusty Ducks frequented the big waves and sharp bends of the South Fork of the American River. With intimidating names like "Troublemaker" and "Satan's Cesspool", these rolling, churning currents provided a total group thrill ride for the navigating. Repeatedly, the bouncing and soaring was followed by drifting through a calm pool where nerves were settled before the next wild run along the giant boulders and canyon walls.

RUSTY CAMPERS & GLAMPERS

Camping is as much a part of RB recreation as sunny three-day weekends. RBers camping began with the first Dive n Dine at Salt Point in 1975. Since then almost all overnight bicycling, hiking, and rafting trips have included tents, sleeping bags, and campfires. And as RB aged, an RV or two was added.

It would take several pages to share stories about all the food, cookware, grounds, tents, campfires, weather, antics, entertainment, camaraderie, and flirtation of an RB campout.

In 1985, Barry Burrell, Contributing Editor writes: "Friday night, the Cache Creek Campground found itself invaded by 100 party lov'n rafters from our club and the Snow Chasers. The rafters started arriving in the late afternoon and the onslaught continued to the wee hours of Saturday morning. The weather was very hot Friday and the "Raft'n RBers" were eager to sip suds and party. Sandy G. arrived with the wine and Tom Huff arrived with the "Rusty Keg" full of Miller Lite. He also brought 20 lbs. of air. He said it was ice when he started. Mike and Marriam sang and played guitar around the Tajmahal and the Kana Poli Hilton. The party broke up around 2 a.m. with the RBers wandering through the woods to find sleeping bags and tents."






Flier of the second Monterey Bike Ride September 15-16, 1990.




RUSTY HIKERS




BRINGING HOME THE GOLD


1984 Olympiad flier (Menlo Park)







Dear Gladys, I'm thinking of hosting my firstRusty Bindings dinner party. Can you give me some tips? Hostess with the Mostest.



"Well that's it for this month. If you have any Goodies to share with me, place them in the Mouth Box on Mary's desk. I will spread the word."





RB was started in November, 1971 as the Diablo Singles Ski Club. In June, 1972, it officially became Rusty Bindings Singles Ski Club. From the beginning, Rusty Bindings was to be no ordinary ski club – it required a unique, symbolic, catchy name. It is not clear how a bunch of drinking, partying, twenty-somethings came up with "Rusty Bindings", but they unwittingly selected a name that more and more, with each passing year, astutely represented the RB brand. Amazingly, almost mystically, RUSTY BINDINGS IS MORE "RUSTY" BINDINGS TODAY THAN IN 1972. "Rusty Bindings" should be trademarked.

First indication of an RB website appears in the Release in May, 1996

Member Jules Betts launched RB's first web presence in 1996. It was a basic informational page on a guest posting site for Bay Area Ski clubs named "jaws.com." RB acquired its own page in this community website to post its "Calendar of Events" and other club news.

In 1999 Webmaster Robbie Johnson, 23 years later recalls: *I was honored to be RB's*

very first "webmaster"! I do remember the website being at Jaws.com when I took over, but don't remember much of the details. I think it was some sort of free thing where RB had some static content out there. We have to remember, in terms of the user (RB) building their own website, the 1990s were very early days (like prehistoric) and there just wasn't a lot of software out there to do this sort of thing. Somewhere around 1999, it must have been March -*April, under the astute leadership of the* irrepressible Karen Halpin, I realized that (thanks to my paying job in software), I knew how to build a website using MS Front Page, and that the software was available. So I volunteered, and things just took off from there. The RB website went off Jaws.com on to a "real" website at RustyBindings.com where we could update it at any time and post as much as info as we liked.

In 2008 Webmaster Karen Halpin writes:

Alan Tiscareno has been our webmaster for several years now, taking over the task that Robbie Johnson took over & originally started by Jules Betts. RB's first webmaster was Robbie Johnson who managed the site from 1999-2001 before handing it over to Alan Tiscareno from 2001 to 2008. Karen Halpin was webmaster from 2008 to 2009. There are no copies and few details of any RB webpages prior to 2014 when the website was completely redesigned. The quest continues for any copy of an RB webpage prior to 2014.

In 2009, opportunity and necessity once again converged within the Club – Activities Director Gail Mercer was taking a class in web building. She needed a class project. What a stroke of luck for the RB! Her newly developed skill resulted a new, updated, well-maintained RB website for the next four years.

In 2014 the RB website was completely redesigned by Tony Baker from a list of requirements compiled by a small committee of board members. The new website was modeled after the website of Mountain High Ski Club, the perennial winner each year of FWSA's "best website" category. Top priority of the new website was to have a homepage that was both a snapshot and a click away from all things Rusty Bindings.


With the addition of PayPal to the website in 2015, members could pay for upcoming events online. This was especially useful for joining RB and the renewal of annual membership dues.

NEWSLETTER - THE LIFEBLOOD OF RUSTY BINDINGS

The earliest evidence of an RB newsletter is a cover from October 1975 labeled Volume 1, Number 2. That dates the first RB newsletter as September, 1975. The earliest complete newsletter is May, 1983. Both vintages are pictured above.

The May, 1983 newsletter is a 5 ½ x 4 ¼ booklet style with 35 pages. It has articles from Board members, activities calendars, many fliers, blunder jacket stories, and more. All newsletters were mailed or handed out at meetings until 2010 when they began being attached to emails. Newsletters have always been a monthly publication. In 70s and 80s there wasn't a newsletter editor board position and the newsletter was compiled by the Administrative Director. In the late '80's and early '90's the newsletter had a small staff. In the mid '80's the Release was recognized as the best recreational ski club publication in the U.S. The newsletter editors at the time were Tom Jones, Joyce Nechelini, and Brian O'Reilly.

In 1991-92 the newsletter editor became a board position. By then the newsletter had enlarged to $8 \frac{1}{2} \times 11$, named the "Release"

again, and monthly issues were full of B & W photos. Color was cost prohibitive.

The content of RB newsletters hasn't changed much in 50 years. Typically, about half of the Board members submit articles that recognize RB accomplishments, highlight recent events, or promote upcoming activities. Every newsletter was full of fliers of upcoming events as well as monthly activity calendars of the current and following month. Most newsletters have photos of recent Club activities. Sporadically, there have been classified ads.

Tim Peterson was the Newsletter Editor for fourteen years between 1996 and 2015 three times as long as any other RB newsletter editor. Tim's preservation of the 1987 though 2015 newsletters has made it possible to complete much of RB's illustrious 50-year history.

Producing the newsletter back then was both a creative achievement and herculean task. Once written, newsletters were printed, assembled, and mailed to 150+ members. After 2015 all newsletters were stored electronically.


BRY WIDS Your President

By 2006 most of the RB members had email addresses and the newsletter was sent as an attachment via email although some members requested it continue to be mailed. By 2012 all but a handful of newsletters were emailed. A survey in 2021 showed that practically no members printed the newsletter and preferred to read it online.

Once the newsletter became digital it was produced and delivered in color. Web delivery instantly saved RB hundred\$ in printing and postage. As internet traffic exploded web services restricted the size of emails around 2018. The RB newsletter had grown as well and had to reduce its size to meet the increasing restrictions on the size of emails. The number of fliers in the newsletter was reduced.



The Board of directors and I would like to inform you that in our effort to keep costs down and still give you quality information, we will start sending out the newsletter via e-mail. This is the last month we will send the newsletter out both thru regular mail and e-mail. After that it will be e-mail only unless you specifically request it be sent regular mail, by contacting Judy Rech

In April 2020, Contra Costa County Health Services ordered a full shelter-in-place to fight the spread of COVID and RB ceased all of its in-person activities. At that time the Newsletter, website, and weekly Zoom events became the super glue that bound RB during the most challenging period in its 50-year history. For the next fifteen months COVID related stories, advice, and updates would dominate the newsletter's content.

"I think the greatest feeling I've gotten out of ballet skiing in the past year is taking someone who's always been just an alpine (downhill) skier like I was and turning them


"They always come away "Shave," as Shelton is thinking this is really dynamite."

Shelton, 27, took up skiing four years ago and tackled freestyling early last season.

"It's just another new di-mension of the sport," he explained. "It's more expressive and gives the skier more freedom. The difference is tremendously enjoyable and you get the maximum out of the hill you're skiing.

Shelton agrees with Pulley about teaching. "I got so much out of it that I just wanted to see other people get the same thing from it. Everyone I've helped has really enjoyed it."

The jargon of the ballet

skier's stunt world is like a foreign tongue to the unenlightened. They sit and talk to each other about leg breakers, hurricanes, 360 royals and moguls. Hardly non-English, but a mystery anyway when taken out of context.

A group of tuckered-out skiers can sit and talk for hours about their individual antics on the slopes.

Their conversation is laced with laughter because they always find humor in a spectacular spill on a miscalculated stunt.

Try spinning too far on a helicopter sometime. You will see what they mean

The helicopter is one of the more basic stunts in freestyling or hot-dogging. A skier approaches a mogul (random bumps all over a hill caused by carving action of downhill skiing) as a miniature ski jump, gaining speed.

At the top of the mogul, a slight jump is taken while the body spins like a rotor of a helicopter prop. If the skis come back to

earth pointed downhill, the helicopter pilot is happy. If, however, they point in another direction, either from too much or too little spin, one can count on a reliably exciting fall. "You generally need a gen-

tle slope for ballet because you can maneuver better, said Pulley. "If you're doing graceful ballet-type moves, a mogul just gets in the way. But when you're doing stunts like helicopters, you need the moguls for lift."

Besides Shave and Pulley, the only other gold medalist in Northern California is Carl Pretzel, also of Walnut Creek.

Shelton, a civil engineer working in flood control design for Contra Costa County, will appear with Pulley at a Barnyard Skiing Exhibition at 60 Amigo Lane, Walnut Creek next Saturday at 2 p.m. They will demonstrate freestyling and ballet on a special ramp. The exhibition, sponsored by Rusty Bindings and local ski promotor Erling Wiig, will benefit underprivileged youngsters by sending them to the snow.

Walnut Creek's Rusty Bindings Ski Club has won the Singles League title of the Bay Area Council for the third time in the last four years.

"We scored more points and won the championship by the largest margin in the history of the Singles League," says Geary Ritchie of Antioch, president of Rusty Bindings.

Runnerup was Bota Baggers Ski Club of Pleasanton.

Ritchie continues, "Five of our racers have pretty well dominated their class in Singles League competition this season.

"They include Tania Weiss of Walnut Creek, who has won all five of her races in the Elite Class; Darlene White of Antioch, the top intermediate woman; Shelton Reichard of Concord, the e an; Shelton Reichard of Concord, the top Elite man; and Nick Mitschkowetz and Bob Pushwa of Concord, the two standouts in the Expert Class."

Twenty-six Rusty Bindings members will be among 60 Bay Council racers who will compete against skiers from the Open and Sierra leagues in the Northern California finals March 30-31 at Heavenly Valley.

Rusty Bindings racers also will participate in the state finals April 13-14 at Mammoth.

Rusty Bindings look well-oiled in league racing

he Rusty Bindings ski club of Walnut Creek clinched the Singles League title again this season by amassing over 1200 team points, the greatest number of points in the history of Singles League racing.

Incline Village was the host site of the final regular ski race of the year for the league. Singles League is one of two in the Bay Area Council. It is part of the Miller Lite Far West Recreational racing program. Race classes range from beginner to elite.

The other league clubs are the Bota Baggers, runners up to the Rusty Bindings, from Pleasanton; the Fall Line Ski Club from Marin; the Power Hounds, Alameda; Singles Only in San Francisco; Inskiers, Palo Alto and the San Jose based Snow Drifters.

These seven clubs have the same basic rules. You must be over 21 and single. The league is set up for "Class A" clubs only. Membership is limited to 149. Not only do they compete on the hill in racing, in the no-snow months they compete in everything from piethrowing to beer chugging.

"The reason people join our club is we believe in having fun," explains Rusty Bindings club president Gary Ritchie. "I think the reason we are so successful in our racing program is that we stress racing improves your recreational skiing. You put a tree or a gate in front of you and you must turn. The more you turn, the better skier you become."

"Most of the clubs take off at least one week per year and travel to a ski resort," Ritchie says. "This year our club went to Mt. Bachelor in Oregon. It was quite a thrill skiing from the top of a volcano. I think the week really helped us do so well on the hill this year."

Club members are looking forward to the regional and state championships at Heavenly Valley and Mammoth Mountain.

Helping the club to its historic point total were Shelton Rerchardt, Martinez, first in the elite men's division; Tania Weiss, El Sobrante, first place elite women; Tom Rasmussen, first in the beginning men; Linda Bolla, first in the beginning women from Concord; Moraga's Dick Yox, first in the vet novice men's group, has only been skiing since Thanksgiving. Darlene White from Alamo took first in the women's vet intermediate; Vicki McGee, first in the women's intermediate and Bob Scavetta, first in the men's vet intermediate.

In the women's vet intermediate class, six women from Rusty Bindings combine as a dominant power. Sharon Gallagher, Debbie Jones, Lemar Mazzoco, Sharon Thomas, Lynn Rieder and White are the top six in the division.

Little rustiness evident in this club, as 27 qualify for NorCal Finals

alnut Creek's Rusty Bindings Ski Club is an active, year-round club that has even more reason to celebrate.

The club won the Bay Area Council of Ski Chibs Singles League and will send 27 skiers into Saturday's NorCal Finals at Northstar and to the Far West Championships in two weeks. Nine members were individual champs in the Singles League.

Rusty Bindings is open to singles and has been the vehicle for more than one marriage. Married skiers can join other local clubs.

Rusty Bindings president Dennis Heffley says that while the club concentrates on snow skiing probably six months of the year, it involves members in other activities ranging from water skiing and scuba diving to golf.

 Skiers of any skill level are welcomed to join the club and encouraged to participate in the league.
 The club includes snowboarders and has one freestyle skier as well.

Rusty Bindings had the greatest number of participants in the Sin gles League thanks to the encouragement of club race director Steve Bales. But Heffley proudly notes that Rusty Bindings racers averaged the highest individual point totals of skiers from the seven clubs competing in the league

One reason for the club's success is a verify trip to Mammoth for a

racing clinic, but Heffley says even at the clinic, "We're there for fun."

Racing is done by time in various age and skill categories. If skiers improve during the year, they are "bumped up" to higher categories.

Two Rusty Bindings skiers, Elaine Mazzer, women's B and C, and Jim Molmen, veteran men's D and C, both qualified for the Nor-Cals and Far West in two categories. Mazzer actually began the year racing at the D level.

Race courses are also geared to the skier's ability.

Age categories are regular (over 21), veteran (over 38) and super veteran (over 48). Classes range from beginner to intermediate (D and E) to advanced (Elite I, Elite II, A, B and C) for both men and women.

"We have lots of veterans and super veterans on our team," said Heffley.

Open to all skiers whether they belong to a club or not, the Ski For All is a fund-raising event for Disabled Sports USA of Northern California. This year's beneficiary is the Tahoe Adaptive Ski School.

Skiers with \$60 in pledges get a free lift ticket for the day and hunch token.



In 2015 Kama Suture developed out of a weekend by the sea of eight RB girlfriends. One of the gals recently had had hip surgery and was planning on an upcoming rendezvous with an old crush from out of town. The ladies brainstormed how to plan and carry out the first romantic encounter with her previously platonic friend. They all weighed in regarding their own age-related issues, with increasing hilarity. Voila! Kama Suture was born.

Based on interviews with RB friends and acquaintances in the Bay Area and beyond, the authors have spoken with dozens of people to understand how their romantic lives changed to accommodate their recovery and post-surgery bodies. RB RECREATIONAL SKIING 1973-2020

In its early days RB was the typical ski club. Upwards of 80% of its 149 members skied. Newspaper ads like the one below from the October 30, 1974, Contra Costa Times shows how RB described itself as "recreational with some competitive skiing for the more serious member." It would be 10 years after RB's first days before it was a serious contender for a Singles League skiing title.

In the 70s RB frequently skied Donner Ski Ranch and Bear Valley. Both were leisurely, scenic three-hour drives from Walnut Creek. Photos of trips to Donner and Bear Valley are the earliest record of an RB recreational ski weekend. RB skiing back then was characterized by an Activities Director as "Racing was something few members did while most were busy making a human chain of skiers going down the hill ending up in a big 'dog pile' at the bottom.

Seemingly overnight, and to the surprise of the Singles League competition, RB began its ski racing dynasty. The Club's ski trips transformed from carefree, frolicking snow lovers to tightly coached weekend warriors. Casual ski weekends became "Learn To Ski Weeks" and "Race Camps". For more than a decade RB had 50-100

members attending these ski camps each season.



In January, 1985, Prez Doug (Rambo) DeVries writes:

Besides the club's race program, there are a number of ski trips and recreational race series available both within and outside the Northern California area. Some of the ski adventures planned include USRSA Ski Week at Sun Valley, Park City, Telleride, Aspen, Val Thorens, France, and Engelberg, Switzerland. And, of course, our own RB trip to Mt. Bachelor from January 26 – 31, 1986. In addition, the USRSA Chrysler/Plymouth and NASTAR recreational programs in Northern California are fantastic opportunities for both advanced and beginning skiers to sharpen and improve your racing skills and Techniques.

Throughout the 90s, RB had a busy race schedule of 6-7 competitions each winter. In addition, the Club offered several nonrace ski excursions in the Northern California area.

During the 2000s, RB started renting a cabin for its members during the winter. This grew in popularity. In 2004, "He/she also is in charge of arranging the club condos for the ski season" was added to the description of the Activities Director. Typically, cabins were rented for specific weekends during the winter. Activities Director, Terry Nichols, aptly wrote in January, 2009: I have rented some lovely cabins for us to stay in Friday and Saturday nights during the race weekends. For the Mt. Rose weekend, we will be staying in Kings Beach. The other weekends we will stay in Tahoe Donner, which is on the north side of Truckee. The cabins are \$100 for the weekend. You don't have to be a racer, or even a skier to stay in the cabin. Everyone is welcome. There is lots to do in Tahoe -shopping, snowshoeing, cross country skiing, hanging out, or relaxing by the fire.

In the 2010s, as incomes soared, retirements mounted, and flying was affordable, the number of domestic and exotic ski trips skyrocketed. The RB newsletter became saturated with fliers of organized group ski trips. The more popular trips often required paid reservations a year in advance. At the peak of ski trip activity in 2015, RB looked like a small travel agency during the winter.




Aspen Ski Trip

RUSTY BINDINGS[®] SKI DYNASTY

Rusty Bindings' first ski competition was a Singles League race in January, 1973. The club's fledgling racers were led by expert freestyle skier Dave "Shave" Shelton. During its first decade RB never won a Singles League ski competition. Notoriously, though, they had more fun than any of the other ski clubs. Racing was something that a few members did while most were busy making a human chain of skiers going down the hill ending up in a big "dog pile" at the bottom. The story goes that sometime around 1980, at an RB TGIF, serious skier and newbie Doug Lehrmann received an earful about the Club's non-competitive attitude. Fortunately though, to Doug, RB was a young platoon of skiers capable of conquering all.

Within the next three years, the RB Board would add Race Chairman as a Board position, focusing on recruiting skiers as new members, and building a competitive ski team. In the 1982-83 season Doug was elected President and Alan Russell was elected Race Chairman. Together they would help power RB to its first Singles League Championship in 1983. Then in 1984 was selected as the Outstanding Recreational Ski Club in the U.S. by the United States Recreational Ski Association.

Unbeknownst to this handful of weekend warriors, they were the start of a ski club juggernaut. Over the next four decades, RB would go on to be the most dominant midsize singles ski club on the West Coast. From 1983 to 2021, RB would be Singles League Champions 30 of those 38 years. It would also be designated the Most Outstanding Recreational Ski Club in the U.S. by the USRSA five times between 1983 and 1993.

President Lehrmann writes in May, 1983: *Oh Lord, it's hard to be humble – when you are the best ski club in the West. As the best ski club in Singles League this year and SL was the winner at Mammoth Mountain besting ten other leagues in the western states, Rusty Bindings is best in the West. I knew that we could do it.*




The 1983 ski team was Rusty Bindings' first Singles League Champions. The 1983 team was led by top "Elite" skier Alan Christian. RB would repeat in 1984 and also be designated the Most Outstanding Recreational Ski Club in the U.S by the USRSA.

"SUCCESS BEGETS SUCCESS." RB's surge into dominance didn't happen overnight. A lot of time, energy, and planning produced "Best in the West." RB's ascension to the top launched a club-wide campaign to maintain its winning ways. Through most of the 80s, sizable coaching teams expertly recruited, coached, guided, and motivated the RB skiing juggernaut. The coaching team was a team within the team. Comprised of RB members only, the 17-member coaching crew included a race chairman, vice chairman, 3 managers, 5 captains, and 7 coaches. Of course, this amateur sports powerhouse in a major metropolis had its own race clinics, pep rallies, conditioning classes, cheerleaders, and scouts:



The 1993 season was RB's last USRSA Outstanding Ski Club award **only because** the USRSA dissolved in 1998 when Chrysler/Plymouth discontinued its generous funding. Nonetheless, RB would continue its incredible dominance of Singles League competition capturing most of the titles 1983 through 2021. The size of RB's ski teams peaked through the mid-80s and early 90s with more than 100 racers each season. Over the next two decades all the Singles League

ski teams aged. The teams would slowly shrink year by year and by 2020 the size of all ski teams declined dramatically with many of the clubs folding during Covid (2020-21).

Janet Spencer served as RB's Race Director in 2009, 2010, 2011, and 2015. RB won the Singles League Championship all four years. Janet believed recruiting new racers was the best way to assure RB remained the top Singles League ski team. And recruit she did!

Janet's recruiting net was wide. It easily reached her family. Her brother Bob had been racing since high school so he was an obvious recruit. His fiancé Sue also was a skier and an obvious addition. Then there was Carlyn, Bob's daughter from an earlier marriage. She became RB's first female snowboarder. And there was one more skier in Janet's recruiting net, her ski racing nephew Tyler. Once he signed, the Spencer talent was now deeply embedded as part of the RB ski dynasty.

When Janet gave out the racer awards at RB's 2011 Spring Banquet, the Spencer name was announced repeatedly:

"Presenting ski team awards is Race Director and winner of a lot of race points, Janet Spencer."

"The winner of top points is Sue Spencer."

"Top female snowboarder goes to Carlyn Spencer."

"Top rookie skier goes to Bob Spencer."

During the awards ceremony President Mark Greenberg yelled out "What is this? The Spencer Mafia!" The name was so fitting. The name stuck. And now the Spencer Clan savors its well-earned ski identity.

The Rusty Bindings Presidency

RB ByLaws Article VII, Section 1.1 President: *The President shall be the chief Executive officer of The Club, subject to the control of the Board of Directors and shall be responsible for the general supervision, direction and control of the affairs of The Club. . .*

During RB's first 50 years, 38 different members served as President. One year, 1985-86, there were three presidents. The electee was replaced for being tipsy once too often, the elevated VP got married, and number three was a Board appointee. It was truly a genuine *Rusty* ordeal given it occurred at the height of RB's wildest and craziest years.

But far beyond that dubious year, RB's election selections of who would lead the club reflects the unmatched success of the Club's past 50 years. Most all the RB presidents were the Club's distinct movers and shakers at the time. And much like the Club's history of diverse interests, activities, successes and failures, the chief executives brought their own leadership styles, priorities, strengths and weaknesses. But without fail, all the presidents championed RB's winning, active cause with extra time and extra enthusiasm.

<u>The best of the best:</u> Travis Brophy (4 yrs), Rand Stephens (3 yrs), Karen Halpin (3 yrs), and Janet Spencer (3 yrs) are RBs four longest term presidents and receive well-deserved extra recognition in the following two pages.



On day one of his presidency Travis declared, "The members just want to be entertained." Travis accomplished many firsts as President but entertaining RBers was his natural talent, joy, and desired legacy. He relished speaking at any RB event – the larger the crowd, the better. He always had a joke or story to embellish.

By trade Travis was a successful sales manager of high-end auto parts. He was a prolific recruiter of new members, especially the ladies. He loved manning RB's recruitment booths at ski expos. During Travis' second year RB attained its highest ever membership count of 223 and with so many new members RB achieved its largest ever bank balance of \$24,386. Travis was also generous. He freely dispersed Rusty Bucks and opened his home for many RB events. Any member without dinner plans was invited to his orphan Thanksgiving each year.

Travis' four straight years are the most in a row and most total years of any RB president during the club's first 50 years.



3-term President 1989-90, 1994-95, 2000-01

Rand is one of a kind. In less than two years after joining RB in 1987, Rand was elected its president by one vote. Both are Club records. Rand has been RB's in-house counselor, having advised the RB Board since 1989. That's 33 years of legal advice.

Rand has been on the RB Board fourteen times that included three as President and an extraordinary nine times as Past-President. Rand was the go-to choice of six different board's to be the Past President when the expected person wasn't available. That was a remarkable show of respect by one's peers.

During his fourteen years on the board, Rand was RB's most prolific writer, having authored more monthly newsletter articles than any other member in RB's history. His written words ranged from the seriousness of an attorney to the humorous writing about conspiracies he perceived was behind his receiving the blunder jacket so, so often. Not surprisingly, Rand also acted as emcee to Club events more often than any other member.



3 Term President 1999-2000, 2019-20, 2020-21

Karen joined RB in 1991 after reading about Rusty Bindings in Weekender Magazine. Nine years later, after positions as Social Director and Vice President, Karen was elected President 1999-2000.

In the late 80s and throughout the 90s, RB averaged an astounding 220 events a year. Karen was an event organizing machine and was President during some of RB's most hyper-active years.

As President, Karen initiated RB's first full website. First RB webmaster Robbie Johnson writes: "Around 1999, under the astute leadership of Karen Halpin . . . I built RB's first website."

Karen held three Board positions between 2000 to 2019, and Singles League President and Past Pres. (& instrumental in allowing married Singles League members to race) before being elected President twice 2019-20 and 2020-21. Distinctly, she has the honor of still being RB's President during its 50th anniversary.




JANET SPENCER 3 Term President 2016-17, 2017-18, 2018-19

Janet was elected President in 2016 -- the first of her three consecutive terms. Her four years as Race Director and two as Singles League Rep brought solid RB experience to the Club's top position. From her years as a teacher, Janet's congenial leadership style quickly united a divisive Board.

During the summer of 2017 Janet organized a series of independent fundraising events to replace the overwhelming, laborintensive Bachelor /Bachelorette Auction. The new plan netted \$2700 and required about 1/4 of the time and effort of the old BnB Auctions. It proved to be a very astute decision.

In 2016 Janet guided the Club through one of its biggest challenges ever when RB lost its home of 28 years. The Greenery Restaurant closed its meeting areas for two years to remodel. RB relocated to the Tower Grill in Danville until COVID stopped all Club gatherings in 2020.

Tim Peterson (19 yrs) Starting in 1988 Tim served on the Board for almost two-fifths of RB's 50 years. His unwavering devotion to the Club spanned 19 years on the Board - mostly as Newsletter Editor but also Vice President and Administrative Director. In addition, he served as historian for several years. During his tenure, Tim was part of many of RB's major events - and often a significant contributor. He was more important than the abalone at many Dive & Dine dinners. Significantly, Tim safeguarded 28 years (1987-2015) of irreplaceable club newsletters and photo albums (1973-1992). These written and photo records are half of RB's documented history.



Rand Stephens (14 yrs) Attorney Rand joined RB in 1987. Within a year Rand was on the Board and since has been RB's go to person for club legal questions. Rand served as President three times, Past President nine times, Activities Director and Singles League once each. Notably, Rand was RB's most prolific and articulate newsletter contributor since his first article in 1987. Likeable, articulate, and commanding, Rand emceed more RB events than anyone.



Pete Jemme (12 yrs) Pete joined RB in 2002 and over the next couple of years was elected Vice President and BAC Rep. Starting in 2008 and for the next ten years, Pete served as Membership Director and was more of an icon to new members than the RB logo. Pete's ten <u>straight</u> years in the <u>same</u> position is longest streak of any Board member.

In 1996 Joann started her many years of dedicated service on the Board as Membership Director. This was followed by a year as Singles League Rep (1998) and Secretary (2000).
