Freestyle Pioneer and Advocate for More Inclusive Recognition in Snowsports Keynote Speaker and Snowsports Builder Award Recipient

Genia Fuller-Crews has spent a lifetime dedicated to snowsports, making an indelible impact, not only as a pioneer leading to the development of new and exciting disciplines on the Olympic stage, but also as a pioneer in fighting for equal financial benefits and recognition for women in snowsports.

Considered one of the Legends of Freestyle Skiing with eight years of competition, Genia Fuller was an ambassador to the early years of “Hot Dog” freestyle skiing due to her smile, laugh and genuine love for the sport. Combining precision, versatility and a go-for-broke style, Genia Fuller dominated in all the events and served as a charismatic ambassador in freestyle’s formative years.

It all began on the ice, where at age two a precocious Genia was escorted around the rink of the Skating Club of Boston by Olympic Champion Tenley Albright. The mandatory school figures bored her, which led Genia at age 13 to the rope tows at the 200-vertical-foot Jericho Hill in Marlboro, Massachusetts. Her ascension as a skier was swift, finishing second in her first national junior freestyle contest when she was 16 years old.

Named Skiing magazine’s Skier of the Year three times between 1973-1978,

Fuller’s career earned her numerous World Freestyle championships and titles. Her first title was earned in 1973 with her winning the Women’s National Aerial Title and 3rd overall at Sun Valley, Idaho. That same year she skied for Willy Bogner in the ski film “W.” The first competition of the 1974 season was at Waterville Valley, New Hampshire, and Genia won all three disciplines, as well as, the overall title. This has never been repeated by any competitor male or female.

In 1975, she won the overall Women’s Grand Prix freestyle title along with winning four of the six overall events. In 1976, she finished fifth overall, despite an injury-shortened half season and in 1977, despite only competing in three competitions, it was enough to move her overall ranking to fourth. In 1978 she was again on her form, winning the overall World Freestyle Championship title along with three out of five individual titles. Fuller became an innovator in pole-free ballet, touring Europe and Japan, sharing skills and knowledge with many upcoming young freestyler skiers. She performed in over 500 days of dryland ski shows.

All freestyle competition events today, whether on skis or snowboards, are rooted in what the pioneers of freestyle—the hot doggers—created in the 1960s and 1970s. The freestyle skiing competitions in the recent 2018 Winter Olympics in Pyeong Chang, South Korea, all evolved from earlier versions of the various disciplines considered freestyle events. Today’s Olympic skiing and snowboarding freestyle events include aerials, moguls, ski cross, slopestyle, and half pipe, but it wasn’t until the 1988 Olympics in Calgary that any freestyle event had ever even appeared in the Olympics. Genia Fuller was one of the pioneers and early notables of the grand era of true “Free” Style skiing.

Fearless both on and off the hill, she also led the effort to bring equal prize money to the women’s tour. She parlayed her skiing fame into high-visibility roles on television, with the Women’s Superstars, in the Battle of the Sexes, and in the ABC special, “The Lady is a



Champ,” which featured Genia alongside Billie Jean King and Chris Evert. At the height of her career in 1976 she signed new contracts with Colgate, ABC television, which earned recognition for freestyle skiing through media exposure.

Today, Genia Fuller-Crews is still involved in promoting and serving the snowsports industry. She was inducted into the U.S. Ski & Snowboard Hall of Fame in 2016 and currently serves on its Board of Directors. In 2019 she authored “The Women in Snowsports Industry Award” for the U.S. Ski and Snowboard Hall of Fame and serves as chairman of the program. She stated, “I know there are so many incredible women who have made huge contributions, yet never had their time in the spotlight!”

Outside skiing, Genia is an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) and a CPR, First Aid, and EMT Instructor. She is well immersed in disaster teams and disaster / emergency preparedness activities for Ventura County, and lives in Simi Valley, California.

For those of us that had the pleasure of meeting Genia at our 2019 FWSA Annual Convention, when her friend Barbara Alley Simon received the Snowsports Builder Award, we noticed that she still has that same youthful smile, laughter and genuine love of snowsports. We are honored to have Genia Fuller-Crews join us for another FWSA Convention, here in Boise.

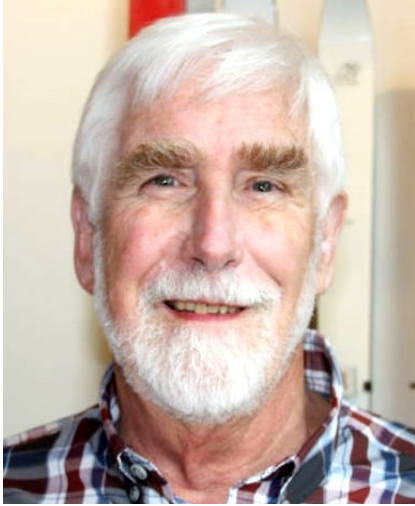

This is a great opportunity to learn how easy it is to prepare a history book for your club or council, from knowledgeable historians.

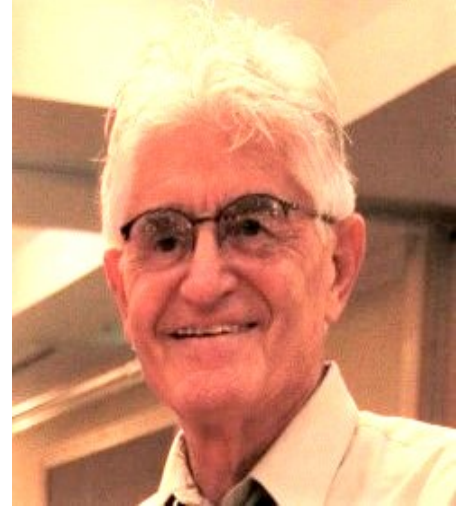
All attendees will receive a four page outline of the step-by-step process. The workshop concludes with a Question and Answer session.

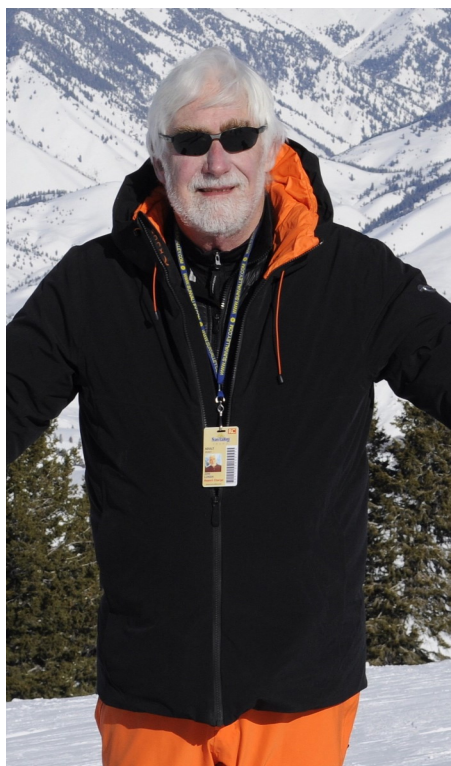

Western Ski Heritage Prize

John W. Lundin

Work to Preserve Ski Jumping History, Expressing Norwegian Identity, and its Role in the Development of Skiing in America



John W. Lundin is a prolific writer and award-winning author of books and articles regarding ski jumping, ski resorts and Sun Valley Ski Club. His book, *Skiing Sun Valley: a History from Union Pacific to the Holdings*, published in 2020, is an in-depth history of the country's first destination ski resort, where modern skiing in this country began.

During the COVID-19 quarantine, John also published two additional books, *Sun Valley, Ketchum & the Wood River Valley*, and *Ski Jumping in Washington State: a Nordic tradition*."

The second book is a companion to an exhibit on ski jumping at the Nordic Museum that he helped prepare.



He also wrote *Early Skiing on Snoqualmie Pass*, published in 2017. Both this book and his recent book on Ski Jumping in Washington State, were winners of the Skade Award from the International Skiing History Association (ISHA).

His most recent publication is a history of the Sun Valley Ski Club, founded in 1936.

John was born and raised in Seattle. He received B.A. and J.D. degrees from the University of Washington and a Master of Urban and Regional Planning from George Washington University. He practiced law in Washington, D.C. and Seattle as a federal attorney, and as a private practice trial attorney in federal court.

Lundin has introduced the history of ski jumping in this country to many thousands of people. Parts of his 2021 exhibit at the National Nordic Museum are available online (including his lecture and interview of Olympic ski jumpers). The Sun Valley exhibit was available during the March, 2022 Ski Week in Sun Valley. His ski jumping exhibit at the Washington State Ski & Snowboard Museum is ongoing.

His TV show on ski jumping in Sun Valley continues to attract viewers online, and his magazine articles are accessible to the public. His March 22 article, "Sun Valley's Ruud Mountain: the Forgotten Era of Ski Jumping," in *Skiing History* magazine can be seen online, and is a permanent part of ISHA's historical collection.

Awareness of the rich history of ski jumping has grown and its significance to this country has become much better known as the result of his work.

Collectively, he has raised awareness of how important ski jumping was to this country. Ski Jumping was brought to this country by Norwegian immi-

grants, which for decades was the most popular form of skiing. International ski jumpers competed all over the northern tier of our country, the Rocky Mountains and in California, against U.S. jumpers.

Tournaments regularly attracted 5,000-10,000 spectators, and national ones 100,000. It was not until the latter half of the 1930's that Alpine skiing became popular, later overtaking Nordic skiing in appeal and popularity.

John is now working internationally to link our ski jumping history with the old world. In July 2022 he met with the Director of the Holmenkollen Ski Museum in Oslo, Norway, and they are pursuing a formal relationship between that museum and the Washington State Ski & Snowboard Museum.

Lundin is a founding member and on the board of the museum. He has offered to help prepare an exhibit for their upcoming 100th Anniversary, on "Ski Jumping in America: Norway's Gift to the New World."

The Western Ski Heritage Award is sponsored by Steamboat Ski & Resort Corporation. The winner is awarded a trip for two to Steamboat.

Rusty Bindings Ski Club is the recipient of the 2023 History Recognition Award for its book, “Rusty Bindings 50: 1971-2021,” Tony Baker, Editor.

This comprehensive history is a 100-page book that is jam-packed with information about meetings, skiing, social events, outdoor activities, volunteering and support of charities, stories, and pictures illustrating the 50 year history of the club. It even includes a listing of the names and positions of all board members in their club’s history.

Former and current members generously contributed their time and expertise to the content and completion of this book about Rusty Bindings’ history. It truly was a collective effort.

The book’s expert proofreader was Susan Elya. Rand Stephens, Janet Spencer and Dave Marr reviewed the book for content and general accuracy. Janet Spencer provided content for the 1970’s and Carolyn Vertuca for the 1980’s. Stephanie LaCount contributed the eloquent prologue about the many social benefits of belonging to Rusty Bindings.

Following is the Introduction to the book, in Tony’s own words:

“Memorializing Rusty Bindings’ extraordinary 50-year history was meant to be. As if by destiny, eleven large vintage photo albums and two ragged file boxes crammed with old newsletters were literally handed to me. In the summer of 2019, I was their

fourth home in less than a year. It had been discussed that all that old stuff be scanned, discarded, and continue as computer files.

The aging, original paper records, could have been gone forever. But instead, they survived and were stacked next to my desk. Until this book was finished, it seemed like the albums and boxes were staring at me demanding my attention.

The more old photos I viewed, the more old newsletters I read, and the more details I researched, the more amazed I became at RB’s incredible past. Between 1983 and 2021, RB won 30 of 38 Singles League Ski Championships. This included a winning streak of 15 straight years from 1999 through 2013. During 1984 through 1993, RB was designated five times the “Most Outstanding Recreational Ski Club” in the U.S. by the USRSA. RB truly was a ski dynasty.

And that’s just the skiing part. During its 50 years, RB averaged more than 150 activities per annum. Most of the club’s activities were not ski related. In the 1990s and 2000s RB averaged more than 220 events per year or almost 20 events a month. All this hyperactivity equates to an astounding 7,500 events in 50 years. From 1971 to 2021, not only did RB do more than any other ski club, but so much of it was wild and unique.

This book covers forty different RB topics. Most of the topics are fully illustrated with photos and fliers. Deservingly, lists, tables, and commentary of



the presidents and the boards fill 19 pages. All 265 board members in RB’s history are listed.

Most everything written in the book was derived from the newsletters. The rest came from a few old newspaper articles or were told to me by credible past members.

The book is 100 pages by design. Some activities and events are not in the book for lack of space and documented details. Anything printed in italics are unedited words copied from the newsletters. Authors are always recognized. The Prologue superbly describes RB’s social interactions and rewards. Every effort was made to describe RB’s history as it was.

Rusty Bindings, decade by decade, has surpassed its toughest competition in skiing, activities, and consistent membership. Because of Rusty Bindings’ national ski successes, remarkable number and variety of activities, and solid documentation of its history, I believe a strong argument can be made that RB was the most outstanding recreational ski club in America from 1971-2021. THE PROOF IS HEREIN.”



Richard Lubin Safety Person of the Year

Barbara Razo, a woman of boundless energy, a positive attitude, selfless volunteer, and dedicated to any task she undertakes, has been named the 2023 Richard Lubin Safety Person of the Year.

Barbara serves on the Big Bear Ski Patrol (BBSP) for the Big Bear Mountain Resorts, in the Southern California Region of the National Ski Patrol (NSP). She received the NSP 20 Year Service Recognition Award in 2021.

She is a member of the Southern California Region Safety & Wellness Team at her local Big Bear Mountain Resorts. This is a new national NSP Education program that teaches patrollers how to “bring the calm” during times of trauma, anxiety and distress while responding to injured and ill resort guests.

This past year she attended the St. Alphonsus Medical Center 15th Annual Ski & Trauma Conference in Sun Valley, Idaho, representing the Far West Division and Southern California Region of NSP.

Barbara is an Active Emergency Medi-

cal Technician (EMT) / Field Training Officer Licensed in the State of California and trained in prehospital trauma, cardiac, pediatric, pregnancy, burn emergencies / Emergency Disaster Planning / Fire Extinguisher since 2000.

She is also licensed as a Basic Life Support Provider in CPR and AED, with the American Heart Association. She has served as the Big Bear Ski Patrol Room Lead Patroller and Candidate Trainer since 2006. To have someone with her training and experience in a mountain patrol room is truly a blessing.

An Executive Secretary to the President/CEO of Rise Management Group, a consulting company that manages hospice agencies during the week, she then devotes her time to National Ski Patrol duties in the evenings and weekends.

Until recently, when not patrolling, she also drove an ambulance on weekends and was a healthcare worker on the front lines during the COVID pandemic.

Last year Barbara decided to take her skills to yet another level and became certified in Outdoor Emergency Care (OEC), and is now the Lead OEC Instructor for the OEC Course in Orange County, California.

She is an integral part of the training team for new patrol candidates and serves as the Human Resources Liaison to the volunteer patrollers and resort area management.

Barbara Razo has the distinct honor of being named the “Outstanding Patroller of the Nation” in 2016, receiving a gold star from National Ski Patrol after being awarded the Outstanding Patroller of BBSP, NSP Southern California Region and the Far West Division. She was also named the NSP Runner-Up Outstanding Patroller of the Nation in 2008 and presented with a Silver Star.

In 2006-2007, Barbara designed and managed a program raising \$160,000 in donations to help build a state-of-the-art Ski Patrol Station at the top of Snow Summit Resort called the Jay Otto Station, honoring one of Barbara’s first trainers who passed of melanoma at the

age of 37.

Barbara’s special interests include organizing and writing. She established the patrol department files of NSP members as working personnel records for historical and geographical data return for BBSP and is an integral contributor to the creation/writing of the Volunteer Management Policies handbook as an Advisor on the Board of the Local Patrol.

Barbara first became involved in FWSA assisting with the Silent Auction conducted at the Annual Convention for ten years, and Silent Auction Chair for three years. Following in her mother’s footsteps, who was a volunteer in FWSA during the 1940’s, she also served as FWSA Secretary for two years. In 2016 she presented a Snowsports Leadership Academy session “Safe Travels on the Slope,” and has contributed several articles for the *Far West Skier’s Guide*: “The Future of National Ski Patrol Volunteers” and “National Ski Patrol - Recruitment Efforts on the Rise.”

Last November she was appointed the National Ski Patrol Liaison to the Far West Board of Directors, a position formerly held by Ron Anderson, NSP. This appointment was in recognition of the importance ski safety is, and will continue to be, in snowsports.

Barbara is a member of Huntington Beach Ski Club, Orange Council of Ski Clubs.

This year’s new sponsor of the Richard Lubin Safety Person of the Year is Holiday Ski Tours and Mammoth Mountain. Barbara will receive four days lodging and 3 of 4 day lift passes for two to Mammoth Mountain Ski Area.

Snowsports Builder Award

Brad Wilson

Building Upon a Community's Passion for Snowsports and Year-Round Recreation Area

Brad Wilson, the current General Manager of the Bogus Basin Mountain Recreation Area, Idaho, has more than 30 years of experience in management, marketing, sales, and master planning within the ski and hospitality industry. He took the reins at Bogus Basin in November of 2015.

Brad is truly a snowsports builder - creating, expanding, and improving programs since his college years. He first worked in a ski shop until he graduated from Fresno State University in California. Next, he worked as a professional ski patrolman, then a ski shop owner.

His former positions held include GM of Diamond Peak Ski Resort at Lake Tahoe, and has also worked as president and COO of Catalina Island Resort Services, Director of Marketing at Alpine Meadows, Director of Sales at Heavenly Valley and Assistant GM at Mountain High Resort. He has also served in lead marketing roles at Sugarbush, Bear Mountain, and Brian Head resorts.

In addition to skiing, Brad is an avid mountain biker, which is part of what enticed him to Boise. Bogus Basin is the largest non-profit ski area in the U.S., and the Bogus Basin Recreation Association (BBRA), located on private and leased land in the Boise National Forest, operates Bogus. Being a 501(c)(3) enables Bogus Basin to reinvest all profits into the recreational resort.

Since he was hired as General Manager of Bogus Basin, Brad subsequently steered BBRA into a booming year-round recreation area. He helped build upon the community's passion for skiing, mountain biking and outdoor recreating. He serves as the president of the

Idaho Ski Areas Association and is on the board of the BBRA. He is also on the board of the National Ski Areas Association.

From the beginning of his tenure as General Manager, Brad envisioned a family friendly, affordable and accessible outdoor recreational opportunity for all. In 2017 he jumpstarted a 10-year Master Plan that has been completed in five years. Brad's Master plan consisted of three parts: 1) Summer Business Plan; 2) Snowmaking; and 3) Chair Lifts.

The "Bogus Basin Project," as it came to be called, needed seed money in order to begin to execute the plan, so Brad appealed to the community to contribute. Brad's appeal raised \$6 million to move forward, due to donations by large corporations and thousands of small donations.

He has expanded night skiing terrain through affordable lift tickets and passes. In addition, during Brad's time at the helm, the cross country ski area bought new trail making machines. Slashing daily lift tickets and season pass prices have provided accessibility for new skiers and more people, especially younger generations, with winter participants numbering 350,000 this season.

Brad has demonstrated his commitment to attracting younger snowsports enthusiasts.

One of his goals is to provide the possibility for every youngster in the Treasure Valley to participate in snowsports. This season BBRA fully subsidized students from a Title I school with transportation, ski lessons, and equipment. The addition of terrain parks continues to attract a younger



demographic of snowsports enthusiasts. He launched the "Chair Rider" program that employs 50-60 high school aged youngsters to ride the chair lifts with youngsters enrolled in ski school.

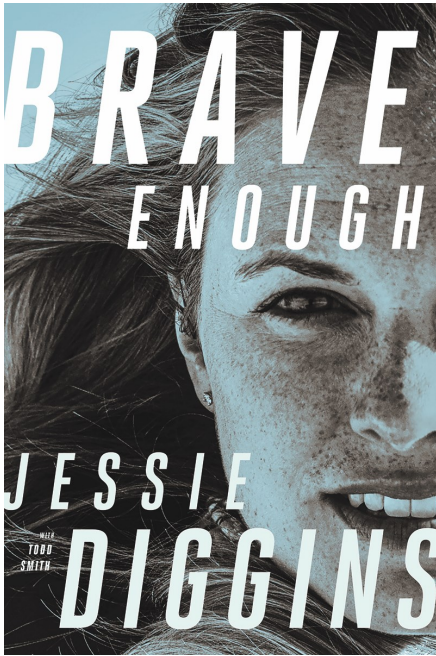
In his future plans, Brad is looking for ways to adapt to the major increase in the population of Treasure Valley. His next Master plan will include: developing 600 acres of terrain expansion into the Clear Creek drainage accessed by one new chair lift (now waiting for approval from the Forest Service), replacement of two aging double chair lifts with quad chairs, replacement and updating of the three mountain lodges, addition of elevators for more accessibility for visitors in the lodges, and a focus on providing living wages to employees.

Brad Wilson continues to be a boon to the Bogus Basin Mountain Recreation Area with his enthusiasm, his commitment to the improvement of BBRA, and his vision for the future, making an indelible impact on snowsports.

“Brave Enough”



Jessie Diggins vividly describes bulimia, stress, and the compounding pressures of being a high-achieving student, an accomplished violinist, as well as one of the best Nordic skiers in the country.

She had the courage to write about the eating disorder, forced vomiting, and lies to her family and friends. At one point, Diggins writes, immediately after making herself throw up once more, *“Suddenly, I felt nothing. I started to understand why people are alcoholics or addicted to drugs. Because the ability to suddenly feel nothing was amazing.”*

A world class talent, she writes that she couldn’t have done it without the team behind her; however, she couldn’t have done it without training her ass off for the past decade either.

Her description of a typical training week with heart rate zone data is really

amazing.

She was named to the US Ski Team in 2011, and has become the most decorated American cross-country skier of all time. Her book talks about her teammates, the Olympics, and what it is like to compete at the highest levels.

She is an ambassador for the non-profit organization Fast and Female, which inspires girls ages 8–18 to be active and empowered in sports, and is also an ambassador for the non-profit organization Protect Our Winters (POW), whose aim is to effect systemic solutions to climate change through the outdoor sports community.

In 2019, Jessie became a spokesperson for the Emily Program, an organization in the United States that provides treatment for eating disorders.

“Buried: The 1982 Alpine Meadows Avalanche”

“Buried: The 1982 Alpine Meadows Avalanche” is a compelling documentary about memory, tragedy and the terrifying power of nature.

The massive avalanche, the 3rd deadliest in US history, descended on Alpine Meadows Ski Resort triggering a desperate five-day search for eight missing people, the miraculous rescue efforts and the traumas that still haunt the survivors today.

Through interviews and outdoor footage, both modern and archival, it creates a sense of the horror and scale

of the disaster in the Lake Tahoe area. The stunning recreations put the viewer as close to an actual avalanche as anybody would ever want to get.

This documentary was made at the right time. The forecaster and the ski patrol members were young adults in 1982, so they're still alive, ranging in age from their mid-60s to early 70s.

Their memories are so vivid, but they have also had the time to come to grips with all they did and saw and each of them have had to deal with their feelings in the aftermath.

We are pleased to recognize the Sun Valley Ski Club (SVSC), founded in 1936, as an Historic Ski Club. FWSA appreciates the efforts of John W. Lundin, recipient of the 2023 Western Ski Heritage Award, to connect with the Sun Valley Ski Club and to invite the club to apply as an Historic Ski Club with the FWSA. We welcome Sun Valley Ski Club as a Direct Club in FWSA.



The following information regarding the founding of the Sun Valley Ski Club is provided by John, from his article, "The Historic Sun Valley Ski Club."

The Sun Valley Ski Club was formed in November 1936, before the Sun Valley Resort opened on December 21, 1936. The idea for Union Pacific Railroad to build a destination ski resort in the wilds of Idaho, in the middle of the Great Depression when Alpine skiing was just a fledgling sport, was that of Averell Harriman, Union Pacific's Board Chairman. It was designed to restore rail passenger service that had collapsed, according to railroad historian Maury Klein.

The Sun Valley Ski Club was an integral part of Harriman's plan to make Sun Valley an international destination and the country's center of skiing. Harriman needed an organization to facilitate skiing and sponsor ski tournaments he intended to hold at Sun Valley, that were designed to attract the best skiers in the world.

The SVSC joined the Pacific Northwest Ski Association in February 1937, so it could host international ski tournaments sanctioned by the National Ski Association that attracted the best skiers in the world, with annual Harriman Cup tournaments becoming the country's most prestigious event. It also provided a social setting for a growing middle class of recreational skiers.

The SVSC has long been involved in training young ski racers. In 1966, the Sun Valley Ski Club set up a separate organization to train junior racers, the Sun Valley Ski Education Foundation. The SVSEF has been enormously successful in training young ski racers who have competed all over the world.

Congratulations to the Sun Valley Ski Club on your historic journey and many contributions to the development of skiing and ski racing in the west!

Century City Ski Club 1972 - 2022



Century City Ski Club (CCSC), was formed in 1972 by a group of snowsports enthusiasts living in Century City, California. The club has been very active in the Los Angeles Council of Ski Clubs and Far West Ski Association. Members currently race in ROKKA League (formerly in ULLR League).

CCSC runs bus trips to Mammoth Mountain and also conducts out-of-state trips to destination resorts. Athletic Scholarship Program

The Far West Ski Association Athletic Scholarship Program is in its 19th year, growing from an initial \$1,500 in scholarships in 2004 to \$9,050 and 14 recipients in the 2022-2023 season.

The total awarded since the program's inception is over \$193,000 to 139 athletes. We express our thanks to our sponsors, Kandahar Lodge and Grouse Mountain Lodge at Whitefish Mountain Resort, Schure Sports (maker of the Karbon line of snowsports clothing), and Far West Racing Association.

We would also like to thank our partners, Skiye Ski Club, Mountain High Snowsports Club, Los Angeles Council of Ski Clubs, San Diego Council of Ski Clubs, Northwest Ski Club Council and Sierra League and Council. Bay Area Snow Sports Council and Inskiers Ski and Snowboard Club have also been annual contributors. Finally, a special thanks to all the Far West members who have so generously contributed to the program.

United States Ski and Snowboard licensed junior racers in the U21, U19,

and second year U16 classes in states represented by FWSA affiliated councils are eligible for a scholarship.

This year, junior racers in California, Nevada, Arizona, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming, and Alaska are eligible. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of financial need, competitive accomplishments, academics, and community service.

National ranking in competitive skiing can cost well in excess of \$10,000 per season; a financial challenge for even upper middle class families. The need is great and we anticipate that the number of applications will continue to increase.

Convention attendees have the opportunity to support the Athletic Scholarship Program by participating in the auction of a ski and stay package donated by Whitefish Mountain Resort, Kandahar Lodge and Grouse Mountain Lodge and our raffle featuring an assortment of great prizes. Raffle tickets cost \$5 each or five for \$20.

This year's raffle will feature signed posters donated by World Freestyle

Board of Trustees Report

The FWSA Board of Trustees oversees the financial health of the organization and has responsibility for long-range planning to support the goals of the Association. Trustees provide the experience and leadership to plan and implement new programs, guidance for operation of functional programs, and direct oversight of the Far West Ski Association's Annual Convention, the Athletic Scholarship Program and the Service Awards, Media Awards and the Snowsports Builder Award Programs. The Trustees also recommend changes to the organization's structure and the by-laws of the Association when appropriate.

The FWSA Board of Trustees is comprised of four elected Trustees - Tom Bundgard, Fran Long, Sheri Parshall and me as Trustee Chair. President Linda Westlund, Past President Gloria Raminha, and Treasurer Randy Lew also serve as Trustees, and Secretary Tina Lyons provides support.

Elected Trustees typically serve two-year terms, with two of four of these positions open for election each year at the Annual Meeting. The Trustees elect a chair. At the 2022 Annual Meeting Fran Long and myself were elected for two-year terms and the Trustees elected me as chair.

FWSA returned to a traditional travel schedule post-COVID for 2022-2023. Randy Lew led a dive trip to Cozumel, Mexico. After being postponed by COVID, Debbie Stewart led a trip to Croatia last September. Nancy Ellis led the 2023 North American Ski Week to Jackson Hole, Wyoming. Debbie also led a group of international travelers to Zermatt, Switzerland, with extension to Costa del Sol, Southern Spain & Mallorca. The Mini Ski Week to Taos, New Mexico, was also led by Nancy Ellis. Refer to the Treasurer's Report to review the 2022 & 2023 Travel Program Financials, which show healthy revenue and well managed expenses.

Far West Ski Association's Annual Convention provides a forum for our membership and industry partners to gather together for planning, learning and celebration of snow sports. The 2023 convention is hosted by the Intermountain Ski Council and the Bogus Basin Ski Club. Council President Jenn Coutts and members of the Bogus Basin Ski Club have worked hard to provide a great experience for attendees.

The Annual Convention is a critical part of the FWSA revenue stream to fund our programs. Convention financials depend on attendance by delegates, Silent Auction attendees, and industry partners. Attendance has been down recently from earlier participation levels, affected in part by high costs of air travel and lack of willingness by clubs and councils to sponsor delegates. A Convention Task Force has been formed to evaluate the current convention model and propose ways to evolve into the future. It is headed by Convention Chair Debbi Kor and includes Trustee Sheri Parshall and other members of the FWSA Board of Directors. Industry partners Maxine Jensen (Alpine Adventures) and Mary Manning (Aspen/Snowmass) are generously providing the industry perspective.

FWSA is an all volunteer organization and the FWSA Awards Program provides recognition of the many hours of work performed to keep the organization and our councils and clubs operating. Awards presented at the convention include Service Awards, Industry Awards, Media Awards, the Snowsports Builder Award, and Club and Council Recognition Awards to recognize exceptional contributions. Thank you to the Awards Committee for compiling the Service, Industry and Media Awards nominations and to Joe Harvis, Director of FWSA Communications, who provides technical support for publishing citations and administering electronic voting via our FWSA Club Express Website. The Awards Committee members are Steve Coxen, Eileen Sanford, Jane Wyckoff and Joe Harvis.

The VP Council Services oversees the Club and Council Recognition Awards that are administered by the following chairs: Communication Awards Chair Bill King, along with Todd Hood who chairs the Social Media Award, Charity Awards Chair Sigrid Noack, and Council's Volunteer of the Year Chair Sheri Parshall. The VP Public Affairs oversees the History, Environment and Safety Awards. The Richard Lubin Safety Person of the Year Award is administered by Safety Chair Monica Palmer. History Award Chair Jane Wyckoff researches and compiles the Snowsports Builder Awards and administers the Club and Council History Recognition Award. Janine Rands chairs the Environment Program. VP Marketing and Sponsorship Debbi Kor administers the Industry Awards.

Randy Lew, FWSA Treasurer, provides the Association with detailed, timely, and accurate financial reporting and budget control. John Reinhardt, our Tax Advisor, prepares and files our corporate tax returns and ensures that we are in compliance with Federal and State regulations, with support and oversight from the Board of Trustees.

Awards Program

In a volunteer organization such as Far West Ski Association, nothing happens without individuals contributing their time and talent to produce programs. These dedicated people could never be compensated for the contribution they make to the association. For volunteer organizations, recognition is the most valuable thank you that can be offered. In many ways the maturity and stature of an organization can be measured by the value that individuals place on the recognition program. Far West has one of the broadest programs of any regional ski association in the country and there are many opportunities for aspiring individuals, clubs and councils to gain recognition.

The modern day Awards Program was initiated in 1966 and has witnessed a series of expansions and changes over the years. For 2007, optional electronic submissions and voting has been added to the Far West Service awards. The Charities & Our Community Recognition Award for clubs and councils was added in 2007. Historical recognition for clubs and councils was added in 2008. In 2008, under the direction of John Watson, the Snowsports Builder Award was initiated. The Environment Award was added in 2015.

The Far West Service Awards, sometimes referred to as "The Great Eight" are administered by Eileen Sanford, FWSA Awards Chair, with a committee consisting of: Joe Harvis, FWSA VP of Communications; Jane Wyckoff, FWSA History Chair; and Steve Coxen, FWSA Past President. Use of the Internet continues to be the popular and a most efficient means of submitting nominations and voting. Voting was permitted using the Internet, email or by the traditional USPS mail. This and past year's nominee citations can be viewed at <https://fwsa.org/>.

These awards are given to individuals or a team within the Far West Ski Association or Ski Industry. All accepted citations are archived at the Western Ski Sport Museum in Boreal, California as a living history of volunteerism in the Far West Region. In addition to commemorative plaques and medallions, a permanent display of past recipients is showcased at the Museum. The Museum is administered by the Auburn Ski Club (<http://www.auburnskiclub.org/>), one of the founding ski clubs of the Far West Ski Association.

Hans Georg Award (1966 - present)

The Hans George Award is given for distinguishing accomplishment and long-term contribution to snowsports. This award is given to an individual or individuals who have contributed significant achievements to snowsports, not necessarily organized snowsports. It reflects a long term contribution and is the highest award of the Far West Ski Association. This award may only be received once and is based on a ten-year minimum service in the Far West region.

Elizabeth 'Schatzi' Wood Award (1966 - present)

The Elizabeth Schatzi Wood Award is given to the woman, in the Far West region, who has, through efforts in ski club, council, region, national or international activities, made a decisive contribution to snowsports during either the past year or in a prior year. This award may only be received once and is based on one or two year achievement (not long-term service) in the Far West region. The two years of service can be for prior years, not just the past two years.

J. Stanley Mullin Award (1966 - present)

The J. Stanley Mullin Award is given to the man, in the Far West region, who has, through efforts in ski club, council, region, national or international activities, made a decisive contribution to snowsports during either the past year or in a prior year. This award may only be received once and is based on a one or two

year achievement (not long-term service) in the Far West region. The two years of service can be for prior years, not just the past two years.

Jordan-Reily Award (1991 - present)

The Jordan-Reily Award recognizes a one or two year activity and achievement in the FWSA Public Affairs programs—area development, skier safety, liability protections, governmental affairs, taxation and transportation. This award may only be received once and is based on one or two year achievement (not long-term service). This award may also be given to an individual in government or the ski industry.

Jimmie Heuga Award (1987 - present)

The Jimmie Heuga Award is given to the individual who, like Jimmie, has made a significant contribution to disabled snowsports and/or has overcome a physical disability and has been an inspiration to others. This award may only be received once.

Tommi Tyndall Award (1966 - present)

The Tommi Tyndall Award is given to the ski area, ski area operator; tourism bureau, or the ski area association who has made a distinguished contribution to snowsports and/or the Far West Ski Association in the past year or in prior years. This award may be received more than once but not in consecutive years. This award is based on one or two year contribution. The two years of service can be for prior years, not just the past two years.

Bill Mackey Award (1972 - present)

The Bill Mackey Award is given for outstanding service to the snowsports public by a ski industry or ski area employee. This award may be received more than once but not in consecutive years. Recipients must be full-time employee in the ski industry or related industry and cannot be a FWSA board member; trustee or appointed chairperson.

Terry Smith Award (1976 - present)

The Terry Smith Award is given to an outstanding individual who has greatly contributed to the advancement of recreational ski racing. This award may only be received once. Only elected officers of Far West Racing Association, including race league chairpersons and past Terry Smith Award recipients, are allowed to nominate and vote.

Snowsports Builder Award

Jane Wyckoff, FWSA History Chair, along with the Far West Board of Trustees, administers the Snowsports Builder Award. In 2008 Far West added this award to expand its suite of awards. The award recognizes an individual, teams or an organization that has made a contribution to benefit the sport, a contribution that has made an indelible impact on the sport and that may not have been fully recognized. Such contributions may not be limited to any particular sector of industry, society, or the sport. Their background could include manufacturing, athletics, travel, journalism, electronic or print media, government, academia, teaching and safety. The Snowsports Builder Award is intended to be for those outside Far West's traditional service awards and may be made annually by the Trustees.

Industry Media Awards

The Industry Media awards are administered by Steve Coxen with a committee consisting of Randy Lew, FWSA Treasurer, and Jane Wyckoff, FWSA History Chair.

Billy Berry Award for Hard News (1966 - present)

Awarded for outstanding service to snowsports by writers for the printed media of an outstanding article, book, blog, etc. This award allows for self-nomination and may be received more than once but not in consecutive years.

Billy Berry Award for Feature Article (1991 - present)

Awarded for outstanding service to snowsports by writers for

the printed media in a featured article. This award allows for self-nomination and may be received more than once but not in consecutive years.

Warren Miller Modern Media Award (was the Bill Berry Modern Media Award from 1982 to 2004)

Awarded for outstanding service to snowsports by the film, television, radio, and electronic media. This award allows for self-nomination and may be received more than once but not in consecutive years.

Club & Council Achievement Recognition Awards

A difference to the judging procedure was introduced in 2017. A committee from the Councils' President was formed to do all the judging. These awards are administered by Bill King, assisted by Chris Gill, FWSA VP of Council Services. Criteria were changed slightly to make the process less complicated and add an emphasis on social media communications.

Tollakson Award for Outstanding Club

Each club is asked to submit a bio detailing their contributions to snowsports. Results from their Newsletter and Web site scores are included in this competition.

Wentworth Award for Outstanding Club and Council Publications

Each club and council are asked to submit one newsletter for judging.

Award for Outstanding Club and Council Websites

Each club and council are asked to submit their website URL for judging. Entries in the Publication Awards will have their web site automatically entered.

Classes for the Tollakson, Wentworth and Outstanding Website are based on a club's performance over the past four years that can vary slightly from year to year. A club may fall into a different class in each of the three categories.

Masters: Any club that has received a 1st place Advanced award or a 1st, 2nd or 3rd place Masters award for their club for outstanding club, publication or website within the last four years.

Advanced: Any club that has received a 1st place Novice or a 2nd or 3rd place Advanced award for their club for outstanding club, publication or website within the last four years.

Novice: Club who has not won an award in the past 4 years or a 1st place Novice award.

Council: Open to all councils

Recognition Awards

Councils' Volunteer of the Year

The Councils' Volunteer of the Year Competition is administered by Sheri Parshall, FWSA Trustee, assisted by Chris Gill, FWSA VP of Council Services. Each council is requested to submit a candidate who best represents their council. In addition, each council is required to submit one judge to help with the judging. This award is presented to an outstanding volunteer at the grassroots level. Selection criteria is based on each candidate's involvement in snowsports; club, council, regional and national activities; and knowledge and enthusiasm for snowsports. Candidates should have an awareness of Far West programs and its public affairs involvement. Emphasis has been shifted to Club participation over the past five years. The Councils' Volunteer of the Year is sponsored by Big White Ski Resort, BC, Canada since 2001.

Richard Lubin Safety Person of the Year

This award is administered by Monica Palmer, FWSA Safety Chair, assisted by Lina Arnold, FWSA VP of Public Affairs. This award honors the person within FWSA who does the most to

promote safe snowsports and safety programs at the club and/or council level. Individuals are judged through the utilization of organized events, educational forums, print and electronic media, on mountain activities and partnering with other, safety focused community and industry organizations. The Safety Person of the Year is sponsored by Holidaze Ski Tours and Mammoth Mountain.

Environment Award

This award is administered by Janine Rands, FWSA Environment Chair, assisted by Lina Arnold, FWSA VP of Public Affairs. The award is designed to encourage good stewardship of our environment. We want to inspire and reward creative efforts to conserve and protect our environment. This award recognizes a special action that the applicant took, or something he or she put in place that made a difference.

Western Ski Heritage Award

This award is administered by Jane Wyckoff, FWSA History Chair, assisted by Lina Arnold, FWSA VP of Public Affairs, and Gloria Raminha, FWSA Past President. This award recognizes an outstanding effort in the area of ski history by historians in the identification of resource material, preparation of historical publications and/or recording or documenting of significant historical events. This award also recognizes interest in Far West's history through collection, preservation and protection of appropriate articles and material. This award acknowledges the utilization of all types of media and is not limited to FWSA members. This award has been sponsored by Steamboat Ski & Resort Corp. since its inception in 2000.

Club and Council History Recognition Award

This award is administered by Jane Wyckoff, FWSA History Chair. FWSA inaugurated a program to collect club, league, and council histories. This information will go to make up a historic collection available to researchers and possibly a book of histories from the standpoint of organized snowsports. All submissions must be on CD/DVD with 5 copies and one hard copy.

Historic Club, Council, Ski School, or Ski Patrol

Clubs or Councils with over 50 years of operation may be designated as a FWSA Historic Ski Club or Council. A proof of operations must be included with the request for this historic designation. Historic clubs, councils, ski schools or ski patrols are given a certificate and receive an electronic logo for placement on their website and other media.

Charities & Our Community Recognition Award

The Charity Award is administered by Sigrid Noack, Charities & Our Community Committee Chair, assisted by Chris Gill, FWSA VP of Council Services. Clubs and councils submit their logo and the logo and photographs of the charities they sponsor. The graphic images are compiled into a video that is shown at the FWSA Annual Convention. The submitting clubs and councils receive certificates.

Social Media Award

The Social Media Award was created in 2021 and is adminis-

tered by Todd Hood, Social Media Awards Chair. Clubs and Councils compete collectively and those that wish to compete for this award submit their Facebook Insights file details. Club Facebook Groups and one club Facebook Page earn points in each of the sub-categories in activity, growth, and engagement with points tallied to determine the winners.

President's Award

The President of FWSA selects the recipient. This award recognizes one or more individuals who have made a significant contribution during the year to the goals of the Far West Ski Association or to the snowsports experience of the "Western Skier."

Snowsports Racing Awards

Joe Ross Memorial Trophy

This award is administered by the Far West Ski Association's Ski Week Staff and is presented to the club with the highest total points for the Slalom and Giant Slalom races at the FWSA North American Ski Week.

Lake Louise Trophy

This award is administered by the Far West Ski Association's Ski Week Staff and is presented to the council with the highest total points for the Slalom and Giant Slalom races at the FWSA North American Ski Week. The trophy, donated by the Canadian Tourism Office in 1997, is on permanent display at the Western SkiSport Museum (<http://auburnskiclub.com/ski-museum/>) in Boreal, California.

Council Challenge

The first Council Challenge was held in Mt. Bachelor when the Bay Area Council challenged the Northwest Council (then known as Portland Area Ski Club Council) to a dual race. Teams consisted of the best 6 racers from each council. In Steamboat the Challenge was opened up to all councils. In a surprise move, Arizona beat out Northwest, Bay Area and Los Angeles. Today teams consist of 8 racers from each council and must be a mix of men and women. And if you can't beat them on the course, your team can compete for the best costume.

Far West Championships

Awarded to the Far West race league that earns the most points overall at the Far West Championships. The Far West Racing Association administers this award.

Roma McCoy Trophy

Awarded to the Far West race league that earns the most points per racer start at the Far West Championships. The Far West Racing Association administers this award.

Ski Industry Recognition Certificates

Long-term ski industry supporters and sponsors of Far West and the FWSA annual convention are recognized with certificates of appreciation. This recognition is administered by Debbi Kor, VP Marketing and Sponsorship.

Director Report

Industry Marketing

Responsibilities for the Industry Marketing Program include: producing the Silent Auction and Snowsports Trade Show, sponsorship development, serving on the Convention Committee, and promoting advertising sales for the *Far West Skier's Guide*. Debbi Kor, FWSA Vice President of Marketing, and Sponsorship is responsible for the membership benefits program and product sponsorship development. Sandy Blackwell is this year's annual Silent Auction Manager. Jane Wyckoff is Editor of the *Far West Skier's Guide*, with Leigh Gieringer as Publisher, Production Coordinator and Advertising Manager. The ski industry invested over \$79,000 last year in Association industry programs.

Silent Auction

In 2023, we are celebrating the 90th Annual Convention, and the 37th Annual Silent Auction. FWSA highly values the long-standing working relationship that our Association has developed with the many ski and snowsports-industry partners over the years. Innumerable hours have been spent by dedicated ski club, council, and FWSA volunteers, who assist with conducting a successful Silent Auction and Trade Show each year.

The Silent Auction began back in 1986 at the Irvine Hilton and Towers, when the Balboa Ski Club of Orange Council of Ski Clubs, host for the 54th Annual Convention, organized the event as a fundraiser to be held in conjunction with the Convention. In 1990 the Travel Carousel was added to the industry convention programs at the 58th Annual Convention, hosted by the Orange Council of Ski Clubs, when the Association returned to the Irvine Hilton. The format remained the same until the 2003 Convention held at the Rancho Las Palmas Marriott in Rancho Mirage, California, hosted by the San Diego Council of Ski Clubs. The Travel Carousel became the Travel Expo, and Passports replaced the Lift Tickets. This year, however, we are again going back to the All-In-One concept, and are including the former Travel Expo into the 2023 Silent Auction and Trade Show on Friday night.

The Silent Auction is the Association's major fund-raising effort and not only provides financial support for our programs, but also subsidizes delegate fees to the Convention. The Silent Auction and Snowsports Trade Show would not be possible without the assistance of many special people. Many thanks go to this year's Hosts, Intermountain Ski Council and Bogus Basin Ski Club, as well as the many volunteers who helped with all the behind-the-scenes work and setup. The "Convention Team," tasked with producing the Silent Auction and Snowsports Trade Show includes Debbi Kor, Convention Chair and V.P. of Marketing and Sponsorship, as well as Registrar for all of our industry partners; Sandy Blackwell, our current Silent Auction Chair; and Jean McCasey, Registrar and V.P. of Membership, who lined up the Snowsport Leadership Academy speakers, along with help from Jane Wyckoff.

Lina Arnold, VP of Public Affairs, and Jane Wyckoff, History Chair, assisted Randy Lew in lining up the presenters for the Public Affairs Panel, and Keynote Speaker. Barbara Razo, produced all of the Coupon Books. Jane Wyckoff did an amazing amount of research to compile the Awards Booklet. Leigh Gieringer designed and published the booklet. Jo Simpson has been doing the Delegate Book for the past few years. Joe Harvis, VP Communications, posts the convention information on the website and has manned the slide show on Saturday during lunch and dinner for the past two years. This team put in countless hours to bring you an outstanding event for both club members and the industry. Our gratitude is extended to all the workers from the host council, under the guidance of Jennifer Coutts, Host Council Coordinator, and Michael Bouton Co-host Council Coordinator, as well as all of the FWSA Board Members, friends and volunteers from other councils who assisted with all the last-minute preparations prior to the Silent Auction and Trade Show to get the job done and make this an event to remember.

Convention Sponsorships

Council Services oversees the Club and Council Communication and Outstanding Club Awards, the Councils' Volunteer of the Year Program, Charity Recognition Program, and the Social Media Award. The communication award is based on a club or council website or newsletter that is submitted. They are judged for their content and how relevant the information is that they are providing to their members. The first, second and third place winners are given a certificate and a digitized medallion to place on their website or newsletter. The Social Media Award is judged on the Facebook groups submitted by a club or council. Judging is done on the basis of the matrix of page likes, current post updates, and comments.

The Councils' Volunteer of the Year Program has continued to receive outstanding individual candidates that have given a lot of their time and talent to either clubs or councils. Big White has continued to be the sponsor for this award. We appreciate their support and are happy that the FWSA Volunteer of the Year gets to receive a ski package for two for their dedication to the sport of skiing.

Convenient Location...The Palancar and Santa Rosa Wall reefs surround the hotel and are a protective area within the marine park. This impressive reef is part of the Great Barrier Reef of the Western Atlantic, also it is known as the Great Mayan Reef.

2022 Croatia Adventure trip

After postponing and renegotiating the Croatia trip multiple times, we finally made it...experienced it...and we loved it!

FWSA 2023 Ski Week to Zermatt, Switzerland was a Spectacular Success

Far West Ski Association partnered with Holiday Ski Tours for this scenic ski trip to Zermatt, Switzerland. Zermatt is one of the most fabulous ski areas in the world. From every run, the scenery is absolutely spectacular, often with views of the Matterhorn. This amazing icon has loomed over Zermatt since the 1860's.

Our 104 participants started the trip on the evening of February 24 with 6 days skiing possible for February 15 to March 3. To get to the ski area, we rode the Gornergrat cog wheel train for 30 minutes to the top or we took a shuttle bus from that train station across town and then rode a cable car up the mountain. In addition to skiing at Zermatt, many of the participants skied over to Cervinia in Italy. Several people commented on how glad they were that we went back to Zermatt after 9 years because it is still rated number one on the list of the world's best ski resorts. It's easy to like Zermatt, as it is home to 9 of the 10 highest mountains in Europe.

Skiing at Zermatt and Cervinia is also a culinary experience. There are many highly rated restaurants right on the mountain that serve delicious food. In fact, reservations often were required. The lovely car-free pedestrian town of Zermatt offered plenty of shopping and nightly entertainment.

FWSA 2023 Ski Week Extension to Southern Spain and Mallorca was Much Fun!

With 44 people on the extension trip to Costa del Sol, Southern Spain and Mallorca, our journey from Zermatt to Spain started with a flight from Zürich to Malaga, followed by bus transfer to the Meliá Costa del Sol hotel in Torremolinos. The Meliá is situated right on the beach waterfront and offers a promenade for strolling up and down the waterfront with numerous restaurants, cafes, and shops.

The next morning, we boarded the bus for a 2½ hr. scenic ride to Granada. Upon arriving in Granada, we met our tour guides and embarked on about a 2-hour walking tour of the Alhambra Palace. The Palace was a huge infrastructure resembling a

small city with many palaces and gardens. We were blessed with moderate temperatures that made walking the grounds comfortable. Following the tour, we hiked down to the city of Granada and had time free time for lunch and shopping.

The next day, we traveled by bus to Ronda. The bus ride was a pleasant ride with scenery consisting of acres and acres of olive groves. It's no wonder that Spain produces a lot of olive oil. Upon arrival at Ronda, we were greeted by our tour guides (2) and proceeded on a walking tour of the city. We were in awe of how the city is built atop a mountain and the enormous valley that surrounded the city. The vistas were incredible, as were the various monuments and historic buildings. One particular building that stood out prominently was the corrida, or bullring, as Ronda is thought of as the birthplace of bullfighting. Following the tour we dined at a nearby restaurant for an excellent lunch, followed by our return trip to the Meliá Costa del Sol hotel.

Our last day in Torremolinos was a free day for touring, shopping, and dining. Although it was a free day there was a scheduled walking tour to the Cathedral and then to city center for shopping and dining. Not everyone went on the tour, as there were several road warriors that rented bikes at the hotel for a little exploration of their own. The next day we were scheduled for a bus transfer to Malaga airport for our flight to Palma, Mallorca.

The best of all activities was riding a historic train to the town of Sóller (pronounced soyea). This historic train with exquisitely refurbished cars meandered through the mountains to the town of Sóller. There we disembarked from the train and continued our journey on a tram that slowly weaved its way through the town until we arrived at the Port of Sóller. The weather was ideal with small cumulus clouds dotting the blue sky and warm temperatures; shorts and tees were the ideal outfit. A tour leader guided a few of us to a highpoint (yes, that means climbing stairs) at the coast where we had beautiful views of the Mediterranean Sea and high, steep cliffs. After a generous amount of free time, we marched around the marina to have a bountiful seafood lunch. Our bus returned us to the warm and inviting beachside at the Meliá Palma Bay hotel and provided our escape from this mini-Shangri-la.

Saturday was our last day to enjoy the city of Palma before heading north to Zürich for our flights home. In the morning a guide led us on a walking tour towards La Seu, the Cathedral of Palma that took three hundred years to construct. We then continued on to the city center where we encountered a maze of streets, pathways, and plazas with shops, gelato cafes, and restaurants around every corner. There was plenty of free time for exploring and having lunch before walking the beachfront returning to the hotel.

We all thoroughly enjoyed our Costa del Sol and Mallorca extension and would love to come back!

FWSA 2024 International Ski Week – Madonna di Campiglio, Italy

At the turn of the nineteenth century, European aristocrats discovered a wonderful place in the heart of the Dolomites, and Madonna di Campiglio became a sophisticated and elegant destination, whilst preserving its majestic and fascinating landscape of the Dolomites.

We are planning to go back to the amazing Dolomites in late February to early March 2024. Madonna di Campiglio is the main point of access to the Dolomites mountain range. The resort is located in a valley between the scenic Dolomites and the Italian Alps with the ability to ski both. This vibrant Italian ski area links four small sectors known both for excellent grooming and steep runs. The slopes spread out widely. The ski area has 57 lifts, and 93 miles of ski runs with a capacity of more than 31,000 people per hour. A spectacular 16-minute gondola ride connects to the neighboring resort of Pinzolo.

Madonna di Campiglio is one of the world's classic ski centers and one of Italy's most famous rankings with Cortina, Courmayeur, and San Martino. Considering its long history in winter sports, it has the benefit of an extensive and hugely enjoyable ski area with lifts coming right down into the town, unusual assets compared to many other famous ski resorts. The resort's altitude gives it more dependable conditions than many traditional winter sports centers.

National Ski Patrol

First and foremost, I want to thank Far West Ski Association for my recent appointment as the FWSA National Ski Patrol Liaison. The last incumbent of this position was Mr. Ron Anderson and NSP Legend. I met Ron in the 1990's when I was first introduced to FWSA by Jane Wyckoff, a longtime volunteer. Having just become an Emergency Medical Technician, Ron was the person who motivated me to join the National Ski Patrol in 2000. I am truly honored to once again be part of this amazing organization and board of directors. I am humbled and excited to fill some very big boots in the coming years.

SAFETY FIRST! INTRODUCTION OF THE NATIONAL SKI PATROL SAFETY & WELLNESS TEAM

The induction of the NSP Safety & Wellness Team is somewhat new to the education programs that are the foundation of the National Ski Patrol.

MISSION: The National Ski Patrol Safety & Wellness Team is an industry leader in the promotion and education of outdoor recreational safety. The Team upholds the National Ski Patrol's mission and core values.

VISION: The National Ski Patrol Safety & Wellness Team will be a leading authority in promoting safety in outdoor sporting activities and events.

I have been appointed as the NSP Safety Team Member Representative at my home resorts Bear Mountain and Snow Summit in the San Bernardino Mountains of California, and we are part of the NSP Southern California Region. As patrollers we need to establish a connection with our guests and "bring the calm" which eliminates chaos. This leads to hope which helps to focus on positive outcomes in scary situations. We are being taught various coping skills and methods to assist in handling feelings and emotions during physical and emotional trauma, stress, anguish, and distress. These coping skills can then be shared by patrollers with our injured and ill resort guests in times of pain, fear, and uncertainty while out on the hill and in our base patrol rooms.

NEWLY ADOPTED 2022 SKIERS RESPONSIBILITY CODE ~ Why a New Code?

The NSAA first developed the Skier Responsibility Code in 1962. In the last 60 years, the Code has undergone several revisions to stay in step with modern language and skiing behavior (and to include snowboarders, bikers and everyone who enjoys the slopes!). The 2022 version of Your Responsibility Code has grown from seven points to 10. The pre-existing seven points were revised, sometimes minimally, to modernize the language. One previous point was split into two. Two new points were added: one, to emphasize the importance of not skiing or riding under the influence of alcohol/drugs; another to let skiers and riders know what to do when you get into a collision or other on-mountain incident. This season, ski areas across the country began to adopt this language. However, it takes some time to make new signage and get everyone on the same page! You can expect to see this 2022 Code used more widely over the next three seasons. In the meantime, take a moment to read this Code; talk with your kids or friends who are new to the slopes; and remember that staying in control is the best way to stay safe on the slopes.

ADDITION OF NARCAN (NALOXONE) ADMINISTRATION TO NSP PATROLLERS SCOPE OF PRACTICE

Drug overdose is now the leading cause of accidental death in the United States. It stands to reason that drug use and accidental overdoses will occur in our ski and recreation areas at increased frequency. The National Ski Patrol has integrated a training program with the unique nature of ski areas (cold temperatures, difficult or delayed advance life support response) for our patrol members to be able to administer Narcan quickly and effectively utilizing existing state programs that recognize First Responders.

I look forward to sharing more information and the initiatives of the National Ski Patrol to promote safety and wellness for our patrollers and guests for many years to come.

YOUR RESPONSIBILITY CODE

- 1** Always stay in control. You must be able to stop or avoid people or objects.
- 2** People ahead or downhill of you have the right-of-way. You must avoid them.
- 3** Stop only where you are visible from above and do not restrict traffic.
- 4** Look uphill and avoid others before starting downhill or entering a trail.
- 5** You must prevent runaway equipment.
- 6** Read and obey all signs, warnings and hazard markings.
- 7** Keep off closed trails and out of closed areas.
- 8** You must know how and be able to load, ride and unload lifts safely. If you need assistance, ask the lift attendant.
- 9** Do not use lifts or terrain when impaired by alcohol or drugs.
- 10** If you are involved in a collision or incident, share your contact information with each other and a ski area employee.

NORTH AMERICAN TRAVEL PROGRAM UPDATES

The Travel Improvement Committee continues to work on the Goals and Objectives for improving the Travel Program:

- Goal 1: To Increase “First Timer” Trip Participation by 10% Annually (all FWSA Trips Combined)
- Goal 2: To Standardize the Implementation of the Travel Program (North American & International)
- Goal 3: To Create a VP Travel Succession Plan that includes a Mentorship Program.

The FWSA Improvement process started in 2012. It's time to update things to see what we have accomplished, decide if our travel program is meeting the current travel demands of our customers, and make changes to our travel program as needed.

Debbie Stewart and I need to develop a schedule to finalize Chapter 3 Travel for the Operations Manual. We plan to set aside time in the next few months to complete it.

North American Travel surveys have identified the need to add cruise and adventure trips more frequently to the travel program. This may involve making changes to the travel program to meet the needs of FWSA travelers.

NORTH AMERICAN TRIPS/EVENTS

STEAMBOAT SITE INSPECTION—DECEMBER 8—11, 2022

Council Trip Leaders and North American Ski Week Staff went to Steamboat December 8—11, 2022 to look at lodging and party venues. Following the trip, Councils selected their lodging and the number of rooms they planned to sell for the 2024 Steamboat Ski Week. This year's snow season won't stop and will continue into the summer.

Several ski areas are at and nearing record snowfalls like Mammoth Mountain Main Lodge with 712 inches and Palisades Tahoe with just under 60 feet in California, and other numerous resorts in Utah like Alta with 903 inches and Park City with 636 inches. We also have Deer Valley with 606 inches and Solitude with 768 inches and Snowbird with 785 inches. Brighton also comes in with 703 inches of snowfall. These totals are as of May 1, 2023.

Not all that snow is a good thing.

With all that snow you would think that it helps the water shortages and the wildfires in California, but unfortunately it has created some very dangerous conditions in the mountains where some residents have had their homes collapsed and some people have been trapped in them for days. Also, with the heavy snow avalanche danger is high and with some areas the lifts have been completely buried.

But the good thing is extra months of skiing and riding.

So, among the resorts that will stay open at least till the July 4th are Mammoth and Palisades Tahoe in California; Snowbird will stay open till mid-May in Utah; Arapahoe Basin in Colorado will stay open till sometime in June.

With a longer season that means spring skiing passes are a great value. The 2023- 2024 multi-mountain Ikon Pass (starting at \$829 for the Ikon Base Pass, which limits days at some resorts) is valid starting in April at select ski areas, including Mammoth and Palisades Tahoe, adding months of skiing to the value of the pass.
