**\$18 MILLION APPROVED PROJECT FOR CANNON MOUNTAIN:** Cannon Mountain, which is part of Franconia Notch State Park, can now move forward with major improvements to its iconic aerial tramway. Cannon general manager, John DeVivo, said that Cannon, N.H. State Parks, and the N.H. Division of Public Works have been working with engineers for quite some time in making assessments to determine the condition of the tramway's systems and infrastructure. The track cables (on which the carriage assemblies roll), towers, concrete tower bases, top and bottom receiver buildings and steel superstructure are in fine condition. Beyond that, all primary systems are within the current project scope. The project could go out to bid as early as late summer, according to DeVivo, but no definitive timeline has been set, and the bidding process will take some time, he said. It's estimated that the project will take a summer and a winter, and possibly into the following year to complete. DeVivo hopes work can begin by summer 2025.

THE SCIENCE BEHIND PINK SNOW: We all know the story behind "yellow" snow, but now, we find that there is PINK snow out there. This pink snow, often called *Watermelon Snow*, can linger on late-season snowpack and glaciers worldwide. Though it may look tempting, and make you want to take a bite, it may be a forecast to a more sinister warning about our warming environment. The unique color of the snow is actually caused by a species of green algae that thrives in the cold and wet environment of glaciers. After lying dormant during the winter, these algae release pink pigment as a protective barrier against the sun throughout the summer snowmelt similar to what humans might use sunscreen. This pink snow is less reflective than the pure white stuff, which makes it absorb more heat from the sun and melt quicker. It has been found in the Cascades of Washington or the California Sierra mountains.

**NEW STUDIES SHOW GAINS IN SNOWSPORTS & OUTDOOR RECREATION:** Two individual studies released by Snowsports Industries America (SIA) and Outdoor Industry Association (OIA) show positive gains in snowsports participation, and outdoor sports as a whole. The SIA study notes that a greater share of respondents participated in resort skiing in 2022-23 compared to the 2021-22 season, but respondents skied fewer days this season compared to last. The survey also found that snowboarding participation increased 10 percent, while downhill skiing participation increased 2.2 percent year-over-year. Cross-country skiing continued its upward trend with participation increasing 9.6 percent from the previous year; snowshoeing was up 17 percent, and snow tubing was up 4.5 percent over 2021-22. Non-alpine activities, such as winter running and hiking, Backcountry alpine touring, including skiing and split-boarding, also saw a large increase, with 30 percent of respondents participating in 2022-23 compared to 17 percent in 2021-22.
